We have just observed a wonderful Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. Rabbi Ourach and Cantor Clissold led us in inspiring worship and enhanced the atmosphere of the High Holy Days for our congregation. Our organized prayer services were meaningful and important to MRT, as we navigate our annual renewal and begin our new year.

Before and after the services, I always enjoy the greetings that we members exchange. This brings our community together. To create our worship, many members of MRT participate, both on the bema and in creating the environment for our services—the ritual committee, ushers, greeters, the choir, shofar blowers, Yom Kippur afternoon Avodah teachers, the leaders of our food drive... The members of MRT and our guests participate as the congregation, including

those attending the evening and morning services, the group participating in Tashlich, the family service attendees, the large community that comes to Yizkor, and those who stay for the final shofar sounding of Neilah This is our community coming together. As we begin our new year with Interim Rabbi Ourach and in the midst of rabbinic transitions, we have benefitted from the opportunity for reflection that our tradition affords us during the Days of Awe. Yet, immediately after Yom Kippur we must move forward. The day after Yom Kippur the Brotherhood assembled the Sukkah and the year continues. As President, I watch all of this from a much more intimate viewpoint than I have before, and I both amazed, thankful, and proud for what we can do as a congregation and as a community.

I have written before about community and I discussed community during my Kol Nidre speech. Community is what maintains our synagogue. Community thrives with participation and involvement. What kind of things do I mean by community? Community has many aspects: working with others on a task, celebrating with others, attending worship services, being on a committee and looking forward to seeing your friends, performing projects that create values to MRT and beyond, ... The longer my family has been a part of MRT and the more fully we have participated, the more we have experienced the benefits of community—working with others, knowing people, celebrating with others.

Throughout this Bulletin you will see many opportunities for participation. I urge you to take advantage of these opportunities. We have many social events that create and support our community. I mention the Brotherhood BeerFest on October 5, and four programs run by the Ways and Means Committee: the Hidden Treasures Rummage Sale, Disco Dinner Dance, the Night at the Races, and the Jersey Boys concert. The 92nd St Y Committee has set a schedule of three programs in October, November, and December. All of these events are fun, support community, and in the case of the Ways and Means programs financially support our temple. Come and participate—create and be part of our community! I have only mentioned a few upcoming events. Every week we have worship services, which offer the opportunity for spiritual reflection and perspective—and community.

In addition to participation, I encourage involvement. All of the programs I listed above have been organized by temple members. Some are members of standing committees and some become involved for specific tasks. Either way, such involvement enhances your stake in the community and also greatly enhances your return. This is your congregation, and your involvement is the way to truly make that so. This bulletin again shows many opportunities for involvement. Please find ones that are satisfying to you. If you are not sure how to become involved, I invite you to contact me.

Community needs participation and involvement. It also needs financial support. You have all heard the announcer at the beginning of programs on public television say that "This program is made possible by the support of our members, such as you." This is also true for MRT, which is made possible by the support of its members, such as you. Our new mission statement says that "Each of us is a steward of MRT's financial, physical, and human resources." One of our important sources of financial support is our High Holy Day Appeal. We have all received a letter with details from the co-chairs, Joel Morgovsky and Michael Kaye. The High Holy Days Appeal requires participation also. Our goal for this appeal is to have 100% response, regardless of donation size. Please look at your communications about the appeal and respond. I have discussed our wonderful beginning to the year 5774, with our High Holy Day services. From the recently completed report of the Atid Task Force, we learned that we value community. At our best, our members treasure the sense of community that they have found and that they create at MRT.

May we move forward together, continuing to create our community.

Summary of September 17th Board of Trustees meeting: from Jim Halpern, MRT Recording Sec'y

The Board would like to acknowledge positive happenings within our congregation.

Thank you to Rabbi Ourach, Cantor Clissold, our office staff, the Ritual Committee and just about everyone else for making the High Holy Days so meaningful. Attendance was larger than it has been in several years. Our Religious School is open and underway. We would like to welcome our new students and teachers. The Sisterhood's Cake and Babka sale raised over \$900 towards our Hanukah Party. Over 50 reservations have been made for the Sisterhood Dinner in the Sukkah on September 19th. The Sisterhood has awarded \$1000 in scholarships this year. The Brotherhood did a great job supplying ushers for the HHD services and with great speed and grace they put together our Sukkah on Sunday. Rabbi Ourach thanked all who wrote to him to tell him how much they enjoyed the Holiday Services. MRT's Garden of Plenty volunteers will have grown and delivered 900 lbs. of organically grown vegetables by October's end to local food pantries.

The MFA Task Force presented undated plans for the Student Art Competition and the Educators Symposium. The Board approved the plan to hold the Student Competition in February at MRT. The winning artists will be displaying their work at the Eastern Branch of the Monmouth County Library in April. The Board also approved a plan to hold the Educators Symposium at the Middletown Art Center. The Board discussed the potential of holding the main Arts Festival over a summer weekend. In general this was a good idea, however, the Board with guidance from the Rabbi and Cantor, felt it is important for MRT as a Jewish Institution to promote Jewish values first and avoid commerce on Shabbat.

The Brotherhood will be holding its "Beerfest" on October 5th, RSVP's are suggested. The Brotherhood is also planning a Football Watch Sunday on October 27th at 12:15. Contact the office for more details.

The High Holy Day Appeal Committee has recommended Board Members contact congregants by email, in a manner similar to the method used by the Atid Committee. This will be done during October. The Board would like to ask congregants to make this the year we have 100% participation in our HHD Appeal Drive. Donations help support a broad range of programming at MRT.

The Membership Committee reports we have 329 member families in our congregation an increase of 2 families. The Ways and Means Committee urges temple members to contact Cora Tuchband (Coralea@comcast.net) to volunteer for our rummage sale fundraiser. Set-up begins Sunday, October 6."

The Pulpit Search Committee has submitted our formal application to the CCAR for a new permanent Rabbi. To date we have received six applications and expect more. The Committee will begin the review process of each applicant in the coming months and report back to the Board.

The Board has begun two new discussions that will be continued over the next few months. First, should MRT invite speakers who have a distinct political viewpoint in their presentations? And secondly, the Board will review the Temple's policy on interfaith marriage.

We decorated the Sukkah and ate in it. Sukkot is our thanksgiving holiday. It celebrates and gives thanks for the harvest. We also said the bracha and shook the lulay and etrog. There are many interpretations of why we shake the lulay and etrog. Some say they

Le'Shana Tova U'Metuka! remind us of the gifts of trees, like say that they resemble parts of the human body: The lulav is like the spine, the etrog is like the heart, the myrtle leaves are like the eyes and the willow leaves are like the mouth. When we use all four together, we remind ourselves that all the parts of a person should be joined together to praise God.

> We are now looking forward to celebrating Simchat Torah, the festival of rejoicing with the Torah. We celebrate concluding the reading of the Torah and beginning again from Bereshit (Genesis.) We will have seven Hakkafot (processions) with the Torahs. We will sing and

Attendees will include lay leaders and professionals, youth, congregants and clergy.

Rabbi Richard (Rick) Jacobs, President of URJ, is promoting the Biennial as an event where Reform Jews gather to learn, to pray, to share ideas, to dance and sing. A list of inspiring speakers will help members make policy decisions and form new connections.

As many as 100 workshops will be conducted and marketing will be a focus of discussion as a tool for building congregations.

The Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism (RAC) is the voice of the Reform Movement bringing Torah values of social justice, equality and human dignity to the halls of power. RAC has been active during the past several months in just a few of the areas of concern through testimony and/or press releases:



A letter from Laura Coyne, MRT Confirmand 2007 to Cantor Clissold

Dear Gaby,

The beginning of the Jewish New Year this week reminded me to look back on the events of this past year and be thankful for all of the experiences I was able to take advantage of. This past summer, I was fortunate enough to have the opportunity to travel to Israel and represent the Unites States in an international competition, which is something I never imagined I would be able do. I trained alongside some of America's most talented Jewish athletes, and competed against top runners from around the world. I was able to run and travel with the team all over Israel, and form friendships that I have continued since returning to America.

I want to take this opportunity to thank you from the bottom of my heart for your generous contribution to my Maccabiah fundraising goal. Because of your support, I was able to fully fund my trip and spend three unforgettable weeks in Israel.

During the first week of the Maccabi USA program, all USA athletes lived together on Kibbutz Shefayim where we were able to bond and socialize. We traveled across Israel, learning about its history and culture. At the end of the first week, all of the Maccabi athletes from every country gathered in Jerusalem for the Opening Ceremonies. Walking into the sold out stadium was one of the most memorable experiences of the trip. Thousands of Jewish athletes piled into the stadium for one last event before the beginning of the competitions. This year USA brought one of its largest and most talented teams, bringing home a total of 175 medals.

I competed in three events during the games; the 1500m, 800m, and 4x400m relay. Racing in Israel's national athletic stadium under the lights was an adrenaline-pumping experience. This track meet marked the culmination of my competitive running career, and I am so grateful that it was a successful last race. I ran my personal best in the 1500m (4:37) to place 4th overall, and our 4x400m relay team ran off with the bronze medal! Ending my career on such a positive note with incredible teammates is certainly an unforgettable feeling. I am so grateful for the Maccabiah program because it gave me the opportunity to connect with Jewish student athletes who share my passion for running and competition, now I have friends and teammates across the country.

Without your support, none of this would have been possible. I am sincerely thankful for your donation, and I look forward to seeing you so I can tell you more about my trip. Have a great year!



MESSAGE RECEIVED FROM INTERFAITH NEIGHBORS

(FYI All contributions to MRT's Fund for the Homeless are sent to Interfaith Neighbors)

"Dear Friends:

On June 12, Interfaith Neighbors celebrated its twenty-fifth anniversary. It is difficult for us to believe that twenty-five years have passed since we first met and learned about homelessness in Monmouth County. It was a revelation to us because we considered Monmouth County to be an affluent area. We thought that the homeless were, for the most part, in that predicament because of their own doing.

We found out that was far from the truth. Here are some of the reasons families encounter the crisis of homelessness:

- *Unskilled workers simply don't earn enough to pay the high cost of rent.
- *Families that just scrape by are put in a crisis mode when a car needs repair.
- *Families that depend on two incomes lose one source of income.
- *A child is stricken with cancer (this happens all too often) and one parent is required to leave his or her job to be a caretaker.
- *A disaster like Sandy turns everyone's life upside down.

Interfaith Neighbors has become a safety net in these situations by providing rental assistance for the working poor. Struggling families have come to rely on us when in desperate need of assistance- and have come to rely on congregational support, both financial and through prayer, to sustain us in helping others. Knowing that we can count on you is also an encouragement for us to continue in our mission.

Please share this letter with your congregation- and thank you in advance for whatever contribution you can make at this time. We know from past experience that the needs increase as summer turns to fall and winter approaches. We are doing our best to be prepared."

Inclusiveness


We welcome all who choose to embrace Judaism in their lives and homes, regardless of background. As builders of community, we care about each other in all our diversity.

Lifelong Learning


MRT is a center of life-long learning, where we search for meaning, we study, we question, and we seek the sacred. Learning enables us all to progress from knowledge to commitment to action.
