# What does it mean for the American Jewish Community to be pro-Israel?

Jeremy Ben-Ami is the President and founder of J Street, the pro-Israel, pro-peace lobby. He has nearly thirty years of experience in government, politics and communications, here and in Israel. His political resume includes serving as President Bill Clinton's Deputy Domestic Policy Adviser in the mid-1990s and as Policy Director on Howard Dean's Presidential Campaign in 2004. His father was born in Tel Aviv, and much of his family lives in Israel. Jeremy was named one of the Forward's 50 most influential Jews in America for 3 years in a row from 2007 to 2009, and The Jerusalem Post named him one of the 50 most influential Jews in the world in 2010 and 2012.

**David Harris has been the executive director of AJC since 1990.** Described by a top Israeli official as "the consummate Jewish diplomat of our time," he has been invited to speak at some of the world's most prestigious forums, including the World Economic Forum in Davos, and has testified before the U.S. Congress, the UN Human Rights Commission and the French Parliament.

John Podhoretz is the editor of Commentary Magazine. He also writes a column for the New York Post and is a contributing editor at the Weekly Standard, the magazine he co-founded in 1995. He was a speechwriter for President Ronald Reagan, a consultant to NBC's "The West Wing" and was a five-time Jeopardy champion.

Jane Eisner is the editor-in-chief of the Jewish Daily Forward, America's foremost national Jewish news organization. Online and in print, the Forward is the authoritative source of news, opinion, arts and culture in the Jewish world. # From Rabbi Bob Ourach



Probably no Jewish holiday has become as commercialized as Chanukah. The reason behind it is understandable, and yet Chanukah cannot simply be a Jewish substitute for Christmas. Every once in a while it is therefore a

good idea to remind ourselves just what the holiday is all about.

The story of Chanukah and the miracle of the cruse of oil's lasting for eight days is well known. However, this legend about the oil, while a part of our religious school education, is really probably little more than a legend. The real meaning and significance of this holiday is not so much found in the lights we kindle but in the name of the holiday itself.

Chanukah means "dedication" and to the Maccabees it meant a re-dedication of what to them was holy. It was a cleansing of the Temple. It was repairing the damage Antiochus and the Syrians had done both physically and emotionally to the Jewish people.

The brave band of guerilla fighters who followed Judah Maccabee and who were victorious against a formidable enemy believed in their cause. They lived in the hills for years before they were able to bring freedom again to their people and Jerusalem. Had they not been men of great perseverance, we might not be here today.

They were truly dedicated to a cause and a lifestyle that to them was uncompromisable. The idols of their oppressors were an abomination to them. Their dedication and faith were unmitigated by seemingly insurmountable odds.

Today in our society and community the Maccabees' quality of faith and dedication should serve as models for our own Jewish existence. Indeed, our struggle is not for freedom (although the potential erosion of our freedoms is a serious concern), but for the kind of identity and enthusiasm that they so keenly felt. We struggle against the freedom to become like everyone else. Let their sacrifice for Judaism in ages past not be lost in our generation by an overwhelming apathy. As we kindle the Chanukah lights, let us re-dedicate ourselves to personal commitment to our people and faith. If Judaism is worth preserving, the commitment can be no less than personal.

# From Cantor Gabrielle Clissold



We have had some incredibly destructive natural disasters in the last month. Between the terrible storms that destroyed the Philippines and tornados in the American Mid-West, people are suffering.

However, one does not have to look at the news to see tragedy and suffering. Everyday I look

around our own community and know many have a lot going on in their lives. Very challenging events occur and these moments make us question. Often it feels hard to say, "thank you" and when bad things happen we struggle with this. There are times it feels almost impossible to be grateful. Why does Judaism say we have to say thank you? *Modim Anachnu Lach*? Why does life have to be so hard?

We have celebrated the merger of Chanukah and Thanksgiving. One holiday is Jewish and the other American but there is similarity and connection between the two observances. Chanukah (as I have written in previous articles) is a belated observance of Sukkot. The Puritans used Sukkot as the biblical basis for our American holiday of Thanksgiving. Thanksgiving has become a national holiday centered upon an amazing meal and the instruction to feel grateful.

I have hundreds of reasons to feel grateful; my family, our wonderful temple, good health, friends. I am fortunate! However I will admit that there are times I feel overwhelmed by the little things in life. Piles of papers that clutter my counters, paperwork I need to do, appointments I need to make, grocery shopping, cleaning up after the older dog (who leave us presents), children who don't excel in listening (yet), lost keys, lost phones, the lost remote, putting away laundry—we all have a long list of annoyances. In turn, everyday we see people with enormous challenges and true problems—like the people in the Philippines.

These people would give anything to get back to the small annoyances in life. To return to the time when they were drowning in clean clothes that needed to be put away but they are now orphans, homeless, there is no food, no water and no medical care. They have real problems, but when interviews are conducted—the first words out of their mouth are, "THANK YOU." Often people with the biggest challenges in life are the most generous and the first to say thank you. We could learn a lot from this incredible ability to give thanks, even when things are truly difficult.

Annoyances are not problems, yet we often make our list of frustrations into problems. The list eclipses our ability to recognize how lucky we really are to have a phone (with a missing handset), to have a television (with a missing remote). To have such a sweet old dog (who keeps me up all night). How lucky we truly are to be overwhelmed with frustrations but not real problems. Judaism teaches that everyday we must say thank you—*Modim Anachnu Lach*. We are grateful—we give thanks! There is always something you can say "thank you" about. I pray that we allow ourselves to do a better job of being grateful and thankful!

### Summary of November 19th Board of Trustees meeting: from Jim Halpern, MRT Recording Sec'y



The Board would like to acknowledge positive happenings within our congregation.

Sisterhood has raised another \$300 towards kitchen renovations with the most recent Kitchen Capers. The Mitzvah Academy walked to the Chelsea House and volunteered their time with the residents. They also successfully collected over nine grocery carts full of food for FoodBank. Brotherhood's Football tailgate party was a lot of fun. Ways and Means did it again, another great outing at this month's "Hustle into Fall" event. This month, our new Visual T'Fillah service was very well attended. Also from Sisterhood, the book club met with book club members from St. Georges by the Sea Church in Rumson to discuss Khaled Hosseini's book "And the Mountains Echoed".

The Pulpit Search committee reported that of the fifteen applications for the position of Permanent Rabbi they have conducted Skype interviews with seven. Of those, two applicants have visited with us at MRT for interviews. Another two have been invited and will visit after Thanksgiving. The committee has decided to send representatives to visit the congregation of one the candidates to see in person how the congregation interacts with the Rabbi.

The Board would like to acknowledge the honor that is being bestowed on one of our members. Leonard Teitelbaum is being presented an Honorary Life Member Award from URJ at the Biennial in San Diego in December. The Board also discussed the importance of making our congregation aware of the achievements of our members as recommended by the ATID Task Force.

The Leadership Development Task Force, also created at the recommendation of the ATID committee to help identify and train future MRT leaders is using the URJ "Yellow Booklet" L'Dor V'Dor: Creating a New Generation off Temple Leadership as a foundation of its work. The Task force is made up of 11 congregants. The Task Force has identified its goals as to develop and institutionalize 1) a "leadership training" mechanism, 2) a process for identifying and enrolling congregants into this training, and 3) a leadership progression pathway.

To date, our High Holy Day Appeal has raised over \$21,000 of our goal of \$34,000. This fundraiser, traditionally the large one of the year at MRT, is entering the final stages. Congregants should expect an email from one of your Board Members in the next several weeks to encourage those who have not yet given, to consider making this the year that we can say "100% of our congregation contributed to the Appeal".

Sisterhood and Brotherhood are co-sponsoring our Hanukah Extravaganza on December 6th. The dinner will follow our First Friday Shabbat Services and will feature a "Latke Topping Contest". Also that evening we will hear from Alex Gellman, representing Camp Harlam. Come find out about this great opportunity for your children.

From Sisterhood...\$4,787 was raised at the Breast Cancer Walk-A-Thon. Additional Kitchen Capers are being scheduled... keep an eye out for the dates. Movie night will be December 9. Additional films for March April and May as scheduled. You can find out information on the movies in our new lobby pamphlet holder, generously donated through Sisterhood. Thank you.

Rabbi Ourach wanted to thank David Levinsky and the entire Ways and Means group of volunteers for the work that they are doing. Our confirmation class is going strong with nine students participating this year. We had a great time this month at our Bagels and Blocks breakfast. On December 8th, MRT is proud to welcome US Representative Debbie Wasserman Schultz, who will be speaking on the topic "What is it Like to be a Jewish Woman on the National Political Stage". Cantor Clissold reported that 92nd St Y has been going great! The Fleisher/Gibbs program was fantastic and everyone also loved the Alan Dershowitz interview. We are looking forward to the last one of the Fall season on December 16th which will be about Israel. On Sunday, November 24th Julie Silver will perform on our bima. Our Interfaith Thanksgiving service will be on Wednesday November 27th at 8 pm. The Mitzvah Academy schedule is out for the year. Check out all the things we do like participate in the Breast Cancer Walk, completing an enormous food collection and meeting with residents of the Chelsea. We had a successful showing of Visual T'fillah and are working on the next VT which will be on February 21st. We are very proud of our seventh graders who raised \$131.00 for Jewish Family and Children's Service Thanksgiving food drive by holding two bake sales. Thanks to our seventh grade families for baking delicious goodies for us to sell. They also collected food for Thanksgiving baskets for needy families. Thank you all for your generous donations.

I feel so proud to be a Jew when I hear about Israel sending help to the Philippines after Typhoon Haiyan. The IDF (Israel Defense Force) sent Hebrew names at our PACT a delegation to provide search, rescue and medical services to the

storm ravaged Philippines. hope you are all enjoying Israelis have set up a field our festival of lights with hospital and they are treating the children who light up hundreds of patients a day. Israeli doctors delivered the first baby hospital and his parents named him Israel to thank them. Israel has a special relationship with the Philippines because of the large number of guest workers from the Philippines living in Israel. Israelis are also experts in dealing with emergency scenarios. The Israelis are showing us how Jews respond to emergencies.

> We are inspired by the Jewish value of Tikkun Olam, 'Healing the World'. The URJ has appealed to us to help by donating December 15<sup>th</sup> - 4<sup>th</sup> Grade PACT funds to aid the victims of Typhoon Haiyan. Our students will donate all the Tzedakkah collected in November and December to the URJ General Disaster Relief Fund. Please give generously.

Our third graders researched their Principal program. They explored their family trees and made Hebrew

name bracelets and Chanukiyot (Chanukah menorahs).

Our fourth graders will make siddur covers for their first siddurim at their PACT program in December. They will also create a Heritage Museum with Jewish family heirlooms and will be docents when our students visit the museum

### From Eleanor Rubin, Israel Committee Chairperson

Five days in Jerusalem and Tel Aviv was an eye opener on the recent trip sponsored by Jewish Federation of Monmouth County. We were there, after a joyous (and disturbing) stay in Budapest. But that's another story.

Israel is busy repairing the world with scientific innovations that are exported world wide and now providing humanitarian assistance in the Philippines. Israel is both an extraordinarily successful experiment and, at the same time, an ordinary nation of people with their many flaws. Our Federation was on a mission to discover what segments of the population are in need and how we can provide meaningful assistance. Our days were filled with site visits to programs and projects that deal with youth at risk.

We visited an establishment called SUSAN'S HOUSE where young teenagers are referred by schools and social workers because of their inability to function successfully due to discipline problems, lack of self esteem, financial, or family stress. In this unique setting, the youth are taught life skills, responsibility and self discipline with the goal of returning to school or going into the army.

We spent time with a group called CROSSROARDS which deals mostly with English speaking youth who are homeless, living on the streets, often drunk, struggling with drug addiction, violence and domestic abuse. The group aims to instill every teen with hope, motivation, and tools for a direction for a better future. A grant from Federation supports their outreach efforts.

SHUTAF is an informal education program for children and teens with special needs based in Jerusalem and operating year round. A grant from Federation supported a summer day camp experience for 14 children.

THE SUMMIT INSTITUTE, operating since 1973, is a supportive and rehabilitative program for over 850 abused and neglected children and teenagers and 600 foster families. SUMMIT was founded to serve very high risk populations in Israel. A large percentage of clients come from weak populations including new immigrants from FSU and Ethiopia as well as from Bedouin and Arab communities. Federation funding supports a recruitment and training project for foster parents who will take in at risk children.

JERUSALEM OPEN HOUSE is a leading organization of lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people whose focus is on providing a comfortable social setting, promoting tolerance and mutual support for their members and advocating for LBGT rights in Israeli society.

AMUTAT NOAR, with offices in Tel Aviv, provides a service they call "Targeted Familial Interventions." The goal is to bring dysfunctional families together with their children who have often left home and are without any support. 25% of the clients are LGBT youth who have been forced to leave home because of their gender issues which are not understood and not accepted by the parents. Last year, through a series of interventions including family therapy for teenagers, their parents and a trained professional, AMUTAT NOAR was able to help 142 families. There are Centers located in Tel Aviv, Sderot, Beer Sheva and Herzliya.

A highlight of our trip was a reception for Gilad Shalit, the Israeli soldier who was kidnapped and held in captivity for five years until his release was negotiated. He spoke, hesitatingly, about his hopes and prayers during those terrible years and thanked the worldwide community of Jews who sought his freedom. As he works to recover his youth, he is attending The Hebrew University and is passionate in his support of SHALVA, the Association for Mentally and Physically Challenged Children in Israel.

While the world focuses on Israeli accomplishments and her existential threats, ordinary Israelis live their lives, many in dire conditions, needing much help which is provided by some extraordinary humanitarian folks who establish social services aimed at rehabilitating, to the best of their ability, the Israeli youth at risk. We are proud to be in a position to add our support through Federation.
