This year again, on April 27 we will commemorate Holocaust Remembrance Day. This is a

particularly important moment in the Jewish calendar. Each year we are more and more aware that there are fewer Holocaust survivors living to share the story that still must be told about that horrific period in our People's history. Our religious school students will participate in a service on that morning and the service will be followed immediately by our guest speaker Gina Lanceter.

Gina's story is most compelling and I hope that many of you will take this opportunity to hear the story of an amazing woman who was able to survive under incredibly difficult circumstances. A brief biography of Gina's life follows:

Gina Lanceter grew up in a comfortable middle-class family in In 1949, the family immigrated Brody, Poland; today it is part of the Ukraine. Brody was somewhat son was born. protected from the initial Nazi onslaught as it had been annexed by the Soviet Union in September 1939 as part of the Nazi-Soviet Non-Aggression Pact. However, in June 1941, the Germans violated the treaty and invaded the Soviet Union. The Nazis occupied Brody and immediately instituted anti-Jewish regulations and restrictions, followed by violent actions against Jews.

By the end of 1942, a ghetto was established and in May 1943, Gina The service will begin at 10 AM and I and her family were rounded up and herded into cattle cars bound for the death camps. Her life was saved by her parents, who talked her into jumping off the train. She spent the rest of the war in hiding. Almost no one from her family survived.

> After the war, Gina met and married her husband in Poland They later went to Germany and lived in a Displaced Persons Camp

where Gina's daughter was born. to the United States, where her

Gina has talked to school and community groups of all ages about her experiences during the Holocaust. She strongly believes in the importance of conveying the lessons of the Holocaust for people to remember, gain a greater understanding of its enormity, and comprehend the necessity of preventing the recurrence of such genocide.

She is very active in Holocaust education in New Jersey and currently serves as Co-Chair of the Holocaust Council of Greater MetroWest and a member of the New Jersey Commission on Holocaust Education. Her recounting of her experiences is preserved on video recordings in the Fortunoff Archives at Yale University, the Survivors of the Shoah Visual History Foundation and Yad Vashem in Israel.

It is official! Rabbi Marc Kline has been approved unanimously by the congregation, he has accepted our contract, and he will become our Rabbi on July 1.

To welcome Rabbi Kline and his family, the Board has established a Transition-In Committee, which is co-chaired by Karen Levinsky and Karen Seligman. The committee's charge is to welcome our new Rabbi into our temple family and to the local community, to engage our congregation in welcoming and supporting Rabbi Kline, and to launch the partnership between Rabbi Kline and our congregation. The actions of the committee will

include meet-and-greet sessions, a service of installation, and other opportunities for support and engagement. You will be hearing more from this committee. If you are interested in working with the Transition-In Committee, please contact Karen or Karen.

I describe the relationship between Rabbi and Congregation as a partnership. In a partnership, accomplishments are achieved by actions from all parties, which include Rabbi, Cantor, Rabbi Emerita, staff, and members. Our rabbi will be our teacher, leader, guide, mentor, colleague, counselor, supporter, and more. It is up to us to be the partners to enable MRT to thrive. For a partnership to succeed, all parties must contribute, be willing to share, and communicate openly and freely. I am certain that we will create a rewarding, engaging, expanding partnership with Rabbi Kline, making MRT a home of ever greater meaning and fulfillment. It will be a place to realize our vision: "Open Doors – Open Minds, Monmouth Reform Temple – Our Spiritual Community—where we nurture meaning in our lives."

As we are looking forward, the Board has begun engaging with the roles, boundaries, and indeed the structures of our committees—and how they reflect the mission of MRT. We are beginning with an update on the roles of our various committees and how they serve the congregation and interact with other committees, volunteers, and staff of MRT. This aligns with a recommendation of the report of the ATID Task force, which suggests "clarifying roles, responsibilities & points of collaboration among volunteer groups and between volunteers and staff."

Recognizing that time restraints on our members make it difficult for some to commit to longer term service opportunities, the Board is beginning a discussion, which includes "consideration of an alternative structure of fewer *Standing Committees* (i.e. core to mission and operation of the congregation) and creation of more fluid, time-limited *Task Forces* focused on specific timely issues, [which] is an increasingly popular and effective structure for engagement of volunteers/members in non-profit organizations these days." (from the ATID task Force Report) On Saturday evening, March 29, the Board met with our Teacher for Shabbat Kallah, Rabbi Stephen Pearce, Rabbi Emeritus of Congregation Emanu-El in San Francisco, in a workshop to discuss such alternative structures. This is the beginning of our effort and you will see discussion of this as we go forward. If you have thoughts you would like to share, please let me know.

Summary of March 18th Board of Trustees meeting: from Jim Halpern, MRT Recording Sec'y



The Board would like to acknowledge positive happenings within our congregation.

We kicked off our Visiting Scholars' Month with a visit with Michael Friedman this past weekend. Our students from the 4th and 5th grade classes went on a field trip as did our 6th and 7th grade classes. The Sisterhood had a busy month helping everyone celebrate Purim. They baked hamantaschen for everyone, prepared boxes for Shalach Manot bundles and they threw a great Purim Party. Our cast of Purim Players, directed by Cantor Clissold presented "Rock'n Shpiel", the story of Esther, Mordecai, King Ahasaurus and Haman, sung to the great songs of Rock and Roll. The Men's Club has started its NCAA Bracket contest. The Men's Club is meeting at the

Pour House on April 7th after its board meeting in the MRT Library to watch the Final Game of the March Madness. During the next month the Men's Club is also conducting a sale of some great Passover Wines. Sisterhood will be having a Movie night on April 7th at MRT and hopes to meet up at the Pour House later that evening and join the Men's club there. Last month we had our Winter Visual Tefilah. On March 14th, MRT honored Lila Singer at our Shabbat Service commemorating her years of service at MRT.

Our congregation has unanimously approved the selection of Rabbi Marc Kline as our new Permanent Rabbi and he will begin his tenure at MRT on July 1st. An announcement letter to the congregation about Rabbi Kline will be sent by President Jay Wiesenfeld. Karen Levinsky and Karen Seligman have been appointed co-chairs of the Transition Committee and will be consulting with Myra Ostroff, who was past chair of the Transition Committee. Rabbi Kline is scheduled to visit MRT during the weekend of May 16th. Keep an eye out for details and come visit with our new Rabbi and show your support.

The Budget Committee, chaired by Michael Kaye has presented the 2014-2015 budget to the Board. The Board has approved sending the budget to the congregation for ratification during our annual meeting on May 4th. Copies of the budget will be made available during the first week in April and can be obtained in the Temple office.

The Board approved a proposal to develop a summer program called Camp Olami. This two day program will provide 4^{th} through 6^{th} graders, with an opportunity to get ready for Hebrew and Religious School at the end of the summer. The camp will begin advertising for participation later this month and will be contingent on a sufficient demand for this activity.

On the weekend of March 28th, as part of MRT's 2014 Shabbat Kallah, Rabbi Stephen Pearce will visit MRT. Rabbi Pearce has just retired as Senior Rabbi of San Francisco's largest Reform Synagogue. On Friday, March 28th, at Shabbat services, Rabbi Pearce will give a sermon entitled, "Shifting Landscapes:

Redefining Jewish Groupings". On Saturday, March 29th, he will be conducting a seminar called, "Overlooking the Obvious: The Binding of Isaac Revealed in Literature & Poetry". Also on Saturday, Rabbi Pearce will be leading a Board development workshop. See the weekly calendar for details of these events.

Rabbi Ourach is happy to announce that this year's confirmation class has 7 members and will be celebrating on Saturday June 7^{th} .

Cantor Clissold announced we are having our traditional "Second Night Seder" on April 15th. She also wanted to let everyone know that Lynn Shapiro is looking for springtime volunteers to help continue the cleanup work in Sea Bright that is left over from last year and Hurricane Sandy.

The Nominating Committee is finishing up its work to complete a slate of nominees for the Board and Committee chair positions for the next year. The slate of candidates will be sent to members by April 4th once the committee has made its final nominations. Gan Mazon (Garden of Plenty), David Levinsky, Chair



Spring 2014 is here. Rather than dwell on the low temperatures and snow dealt with by everyone this winter, I choose to look forward to MRT's garden colors: bright red tomatoes, purple eggplant, green peppers, yellow and white squash, and green cucumbers. As I do every winter, I view many YouTube videos explaining techniques for growing larger as well as tastier vegetables, and spend hours studying schemes to rid gardens of insects and disease. Next summer, I hope to create a video extolling our garden's original methods for insect control.

Successful gardens require good soil, ample sunlight, and water.and volunteers. Compost improves soil development and pruning adds sunlight. Preparation for spring 2014 actually began last November when a dedicated group of MRT members of all ages spread a "mountain" of leaf compost on our garden's seventeen planting beds.

The (Elmo) Cohen, Lubin, Pearl, and Vicenzi families insured a good start for our late spring plantings.

To increase the available sunlight for plant growth, recently Stephen Gaudette, James Brewer, Mitch Bam, David Katz and Carl Knop gathered to remove damaged trees and debris at the rear of the garden. Also, they installed weed block on each

row to inhibit weed growth and promote the soil's retention of water and heat. (At right, James Brewer clearing branches and vines.)

Fortunately for our garden and beneficiaries of its produce, Dew Drop Sprinklers (owned by MRT members Steve and Dari Kennedy) maintain their donated drip irrigation system to keep our soil adequately watered.

The final element for a successful garden is volunteers. We still need help with the day to day chores in the garden as our regulars are only three to four in number. Please contact David Levinsky,

From Eleanor Rubin, Israel Committee Chairperson—It Takes a Woman

International Women's Day was celebrated on March 8 and was a time to recognize the achievements of women around the world.

Anat Hoffman, mover and shaker on behalf of women in Israel, under the auspices of the Israel Religious Action Center, was honored among 10 Jewish women for inspiring new societal traditions. Hoffman, along with her followers, have brought about significant change in the status of women, both Haredi and Reform, in Israel. After many years of attempting to bring equality and fairness to the women of Israel, the following has been reported: Historically, only male Rabbis were recognized and paid by the State of Israel. Today, Rabbi Miri Gold, a female Reform Rabbi, has been recognized and is being paid for her work by the State of Israel.

In the past, any city sponsored public event required forced segregation between men and women in dancing and singing. Today, the exclusion of women in the public sphere and the segregation in public ceremonies is against the law. In the past, on certain radio airwaves in Israel, only male voices could be heard. Any question or comment made by a woman had to be FAXED to the station to be read by a male voice. A new regulation allows only 1 hour per day to be devoted to men only voices.

As she continues her mission, Anat Hoffman has stated, "Israeli society is rejecting the exclusion and silencing of women."

Yoo-Hoo Mrs. Goldberg – Monday, April 7 @ 7:00 pm

YooHoo, Mrs. Goldberg is the funny and surprising story of radio & television pioneer Gertrude Berg. Creator, star and writer (12,000 scripts!) of the hit sitcom *The Goldbergs*, Berg was a beloved trailblazer, the Oprah of her day. Berg's blend of comedy and social commentary—with Jewish characters at the center—endeared audiences and made her an American cultural icon.

The group raised \$1.3 million and assisted more than 300 families and several small busiess in need of relief services in Monmouth county. After partnering with St. Bernard Project, Sea Bright Rising has transitioned it's focus to the long-term recovery of the community and its residents post-sandy.

What We Do:

Sea Bright Rising focuses work on the critical infrastructure that keeps families safe, secure and healthy. We will see the recovery of the Sea Bright area through to its conclusion. Utilizing SBP proven-effective, vertically integrated model, we leverage AmeriCorps members, unskilled volunteers and in-house skilled labor to eliminate the need for (and high cost of) subcontractors. This model enables us to rebuild homes for far below market rate, and carry out construction projects with much lower subsidies than traditional affordable housing models.
