From Rabbi Marc Kline



Ok, it is crunch time. We are approaching my first High Holy Days with the MRT family, and I am exhilarated, scared, excited, nervous, and every other emotion one could imagine. I am well aware that for many of you reading this, this will be our first time engaging each other. I am quite sure that there will be some people who will look up from their place in the sanctuary and comment quizzically, "Now, that's not the same guy who was up there last year, right?" So, I want to make this perfectly clear, if you see my knees shaking, it is not your glasses that are out of focus, and there is nothing wrong with your vision stabilizers. Seriously, I am excited to be able to share this season with you, and pray for our mutual excitement to only grow year after year. I can already share with you a few thoughts, though. This year will be different in years

past. As a change agent, I know that change has to be slow and intentional. That said, there will be a very different atmosphere in our sanctuary for a few reasons. For me, I have no idea what to expect. I have been carefully guided by Cantor Clissold. She has taught me all the cues and local rituals. Not having experienced them, I know that implementing them is another thing. For you, the service will be different because I am different. I do not intend a value statement good or bad (though I hope you and I will agree that it all good), but hey, I am me and not Rabbi Ourach, Rabbi Pearlman, Rabbi Roos, Rabbi Priesand, or Rabbi ... Each of us have our own way of "being" on the pulpit and of fulfilling our role as Rabbi. Each of us loves and cares, and nurtures in our own way. Each of us is different. My prayer is that in my own way, I can find a way to help bring increased blessings into this season ... and into every day in which we share our lives.

Perhaps the one major change in process that we will experience this season will be the way in which we are greeting the entire community ... our MRT family and the wider community, as well. We want people to feel, join in, and help continue creation of excitement for life here. As such, our leadership voted to open our doors for High Holy Day services. I understand that we have always done so for Yom Kippur afternoon, but we want people to know that we want them to get to know our congregational family ... and hopefully to help grow our congregational family.

We hope to spread the word that even while we still want and seek donations and support, there is no minimal donation required to join us for worship and celebration. Here is language that we hope you will share through social media. Feel free to add your own personal touch, as we have already heard great thoughts from people with whom we have shared this news in personal conversation. I am excited that we can be open, engaging, affirming, and welcoming; it only makes me appreciate even more, my opportunity to serve here. Have a great new year, and whatever we pray for, that is for the good ... may it all come true.

The majesty of this season provides us the opportunity to experience a powerful and spiritual renewal. We want to share this experience with you. The new year, 5775, is coming. This is always a time to reflect and then move forward. In partnership with our new rabbi, Marc Kline, and with all our leadership—clergy, staff, and lay—we have the opportunity to build family and community, and to create meaning for ourselves, our congregation, and our community. This is exciting.

It is valuable and appropriate to use the report from the ATID Task Force, which we received one year ago. Recall that "Atid" is the Hebrew word for "future," and the report is a guide as we move forward. The vision statement for MRT, which we adopted from the report, is "Open Doors – Open Minds: Monmouth Reform Temple—where we nurture meaning in our lives."

We are truly embracing this vision, with a significant example being the invitation that opens our doors to the wider community to share our High Holy Day services, without a minimum donation. With this, we invite the wider community to experience the meaning and blessings that we share as a congregation. As our guests observe the holidays with us, we hope that many will want to continue to share such experiences as members of MRT.

What are the ways in which being a part of the MRT family creates meaning for us, and how do we share that? Again, the Atid report continues to serve as a guide, with relevance to welcoming the wider community during the High Holy Days and also to building our temple family. The mission and values statements, which we adopted from the ATID report, illustrate the fullness and many facets of our congregational life. Several areas that our vision supports are our spiritual engagement, our education for adults and our children, and our stewardship of the congregation, in all its facets. What I want to re-emphasize here, however, are other parts of the vision, which emphasize creation of community—both within MRT and in the wider world. From our mission statement:

• "We build communities of enduring relationships that nourish commitment to each other and to Judaism. We are a source of strength to one another as we share the joys and challenges of our lives."

This speaks to the meaning of participating, engaging, and creating the relationships that are our temple family. By being a participant in our family, we necessarily create the relationships that can nurture us. Also from our mission statement:

• "By speaking out and taking action, we seek to improve the quality of human existence and help heal our world. As we work together we create a Jewish presence in the community."

This speaks to our presence in the wider community, affecting positively both our temple family and the external community within which we live.

We have the opportunity to look anew at who we are and what we do, as we do every High Holy Day season. To thrive fully, to create the relationships that will strengthen and sustain us, to be a source of strength to each other and the wider community, we must live our value of engagement, which, as adopted from the Atid report, is:

• "In partnership with clergy and staff, we count on our members to contribute their talents, resources and energy to ensure the vitality of MRT's community. We depend on our members to be informed and participate in decision-making."

So, this is a short subset of the guidance from the Atid report, but it speaks directly to us as we prepare for the new year, with new rabbinic leadership, and the exciting opportunity to move forward together. We have the opportunity to think in potentially new and different ways. Be part of it. Let us bring meaning to our lives.

Summary of August 19th Board of Trustees meeting: from Jim Halpern, MRT Recording Sec'y



The Board would like to acknowledge positive happenings within our congregation.

Renovations in the Social Hall are almost complete. In addition to our new look, we now have Guest Wi-Fi throughout our facility. On August 8th, we celebrated Shabbat at the beach on a beautiful evening. Our Membership Committee is active again and we have new members at MRT. Our Community Garden is beginning to be harvested. Sisterhood had a pool party. The Men's Club has planned an outing for Pinball at SilverBall in Asbury Park on September 14. The Adult Education Committee and our Social Action Committees are beginning to work on projects for the fall season. Interested members should contact the office. The Board of Trustees has full membership and all positions are filled.

Our Treasurer has reported that finances at the end of our Fiscal Year 2013-2014 show great improvement over the past several years. Donations and rental income are up and expenses are down. We are grateful to everyone who has helped us achieve this important goal.

The Social Hall Renovation Project has raised over \$3,400 toward the goal of \$18,000 so far this summer. If you are planning an event, you should stop in and see the Hall, it is really beautiful. Please consider renting the Hall for your next event.

The Board approved a motion to offer admission to the 2014 High Holy Day services at MRT to members, guests and others who wish to worship with us without any minimum donation. This is being done to encourage growth to our congregation. Members will receive their tickets as usual and if you need additional tickets, please contact the office. Non-members who wish to attend, should also contact the office to register for tickets. MRT does not have assigned seating during the HHD's so if you wish to sit in a certain spot, we encourage you to arrive early.

The Board has requested all committees update their portion of the MRT Website. Members are using the website more to obtain information about events and available services at MRT. The Board would like this information to be as current as possible.

The Leadership Development workshops will begin in late October. These workshops are being held to help members learn about and grow into leadership roles at MRT.

MRT has received a grant from Federation for the development of Camp Olami for the summer of 2015. Camp Olami, which did not run in 2014, will be a fun, interactive 2-day camp experience, where children entering grades 4-6 can socialize, meet, and make new friends while reviewing, and learning the skills necessary to feel confident for a successful Religious School year. This program will be open to all children in Monmouth County.

In the President's Report, Jay Wiesenfeld indicated three tasks forces are being formed to complete projects at MRT. The first is the Member Role Policies task force, which will review and make recommendations concerning the policies and customs of MRT that distinguish between roles for Jewish and non-Jewish members. The second is the Capital Projects task force, which will organize and prioritize necessary and potential capital improvements to our facility. The third is the Fundraising task force, which will organize fundraising activities at MRT.

This year, our High Holy Day Appeal is especially important, so please consider making a generous donation. We hope everyone is noticing the positive changes occurring in our congregation and will continue to help support these efforts.

During the actual event, volunteers are needed to: answer questions, keep the displayed items orderly, monitor the flow of patrons, supervise the parking lot, assist patrons with purchases and collect money. Our patrons often commented last year on our gracious demeanor and the effort we put into creating a visually appealing sales area.

The pictures were taken on the third day of set-up last year. By opening day, each clothing stack was piled as high as the average patron's height. I cannot over emphasize our need for volunteers to assist with set-up and sale days.

Gan Mazon (Garden of Plenty) MRT's Vegetable Garden, David Levinsky, Chair



As I wrote in last month's column, this season's garden will not be as productive as last year's. Yet, I learned much from this summer to benefit the pantries supported by MRT in the future. <u>Please share your vegetable growing tips with me; they are always welcome.</u>

Many home and community gardens, including ours, have been unable to grow squash varieties successfully. Gan Mazon follows the traditional planting schedule governing summer vegetables: plant seedlings and seeds around Mother's Day---possibly a week

or two later depending on evening temperatures. In past seasons, our squash plants always prospered under this regimen until early July and then the main stems begin to whither and slowly die, slowly killing each plant. The culprit is a moth that typically lays its eggs at the base of the main stem. The caterpillar, technically called a squash vine borer, invades the main stem and causes the plant's destruction. There is no remedy for the borer available to the organic gardener.



This season I took the advice of a master gardener who taught me that the squash vine borer has only one generation. The trick is to plant the squash seeds just after July 4 because moths cease to lay eggs by then. The picture on the left shows a healthy squash plant. The picture on the right shows 25 feet of healthy productive plants. Last year, our squash harvest totaled 67 lbs. As of August 20, 2014, we picked 83.5 lbs, with no borer damage.





The second lesson proves the maxim that plants require adequate air circulation and room to prosper. Cucumbers grow from 2 or 3 seeds planted in mounds of soil approximately 3 ft. apart. Knowing that seeds do not always grow as planned, I planted the hills 1.5 ft. apart, with the expectation of pulling out the intervening plants should all the seeds attain viability, as well as thinning out each hill to one seedling. Thinking that more plants are better, I did not maintain 3 ft. between hills or thin out the seedlings. As the photo at the bottom left shows, the cucumber leaves and vines are growing together reducing air circulation and space for cucumbers to mature. There is no doubt that the overall cucumber harvest will suffer.

The garden is a social action project of Monmouth Reform Temple. It falls under the mandate in Jewish tradition of tikkun olam (repairing the world.) Whether my committee delivers 500 lbs., 800 lbs., or 1,000 lbs. to Open Door in Freehold or the JF&CS in Asbury Park, MRT is helping repair the world in Monmouth County. I know for a fact that the recipients of our produce appreciate our time and effort.
