The Connected Community. That is probably the simplest way I can express my vision for MRT and our congregational family. Monmouth Reform Temple offers a myriad of opportunities to engage with our community to appreciate the spirit, history, ritual, and values of being Jewish in the 21st century. Adult education, religious school, social action, religious services, Saturday morning Torah study, Sisterhood and Men's Club social events, ... offer a broad spectrum of options to bring us together. But the thing I find most satisfying is the "bringing us" together. It is the opportunity to share with and learn from others that makes these activities most enjoyable.

Why did we join MRT? We had been coming to MRT for High Holiday services for many years and appreciated the finiteness of the services that started on time, ended in 2 hours, offered stimulating sermons, and didn't have a constant flow of people in and out, as I was used to growing up in a conservative congregation. Getting engaged and connecting with others took some time. Indeed on a personal note, my position as President began as a journey that started in 2005 when Jim Newman, then president of Brotherhood, pulled me in to join the Brotherhood board. A couple of years later, I was president of Brotherhood, and after three years became fourth VP of the Temple.

One of the key lessons I learned from my own situation and from others I observe is that people want to connect, but sometimes some encouragement and invitation is needed to engage them.

This year as we seek to broaden and deepen our connections with each other, I ask that each of us seek to reach out to others to make a connection. If you are coming to services on a Friday night, a special event, or just working on a committee, phone a friend or just an acquaintance to join you. It will enrich her or his experience.

Gan Mazon (Garden of Plenty) MRT's Vegetable Garden, David Levinsky, Chair GAN MAZON —We need help for the month of August!



I am proud to report that the Gan Mazon (Garden of Plenty), as of July 31, has exceeded its productivity over last year by 80 lbs.

The three volunteers who tend the garden --- my co-chair, her teen-age son and myself --- will have to miss considerable time in the garden during August. For personal reasons, I will be unable to do any lifting for the next four to five weeks; my co-chair will be away for two weeks, and her son for one week. Without new helpers, the garden will not have the personnel to harvest and deliver produce, weed, and perform plant maintenance.

MRT has an excellent reputation for providing fresh, organically grown vegetables.

We have been supplying produce for several seasons to the families receiving assistance at two Monmouth County non-sectarian pantries: JF&CS of Asbury Park and Open Door of Freehold. This season's tomatoes, eggplant, peppers, cucumbers and squash are already showing promise of surpassing the 970 lbs. delivered in the 2013 season.

Work in the garden is done during the relatively cool early morning hours, arriving between 7:30 and 8:30 am, three or four days weekly. Our sessions usually last 90 minutes to two hours, depending on the work to be done. Of course, volunteers may set-up their own schedules.

Although, I will not be up to full strength, I will be at the garden throughout August to assist new volunteers. Christine Gold, my co-chair, is looking forward to welcoming you and sharing her enthusiasm for helping families dependent on our gardening efforts. No experience is required, as the learning curve is fairly short. Please contact me at

Summary of June 16th Board of Trustees meeting: from Jim Halpern, MRT Recording Sec'y



The Board of Trustees met on the evening of June 16, 2015 and would like to acknowledge positive happenings within our congregation.

We had our Seeds of Spirituality (formerly Visual T'Fillah) service last Friday. We also had our special First Friday Shabbat Service. Sisterhood had a fundraiser this month and raised over \$400. Our Youth Group had dinner and talked about accomplishments of the last year over dinner. The Cemetery committee had completed its initial work. Our Men's Club is changing over leadership this month and Mark Kroen will be our new Men's Club President. Our Softball Team won its second game of the year. We are setting the schedule for meetings to plan for next year. Mitzvah Day will

include the "Shine a Light" project the Monday before. Our Adult Ed committee had a program run by Elliot Familiant. We welcomed our new Religious School Principal, Stephanie Fields to our temple via a dinner at Rabbi Kline's house. Confirmation was held several weeks ago – it was a beautiful service well-attended by the Board.

Our Senior Youth Group has changed its name from MRTSY and will now be known as SMRTY (Senior Monmouth Reform Temple Youth). Next year's First VP is Courtney Aptaker. Sarah Klein and Lauren Vicenzi will continue to be co-presidents next year.

Rabbi Kline continued his workshops for Board Members on Moving Forward Strategically. This month's session was entitled "Jewish Education".

The Capital Project Task Force held a meeting to get ideas from our members about which projects were important to them. The House Committee is preparing the Martef for the school year -3 classrooms and Youth Lounge on our lower level.

Camp Olami is expected to run in August. Signups for this have been slow so if you are planning to sign up, please let our office know.

The Board wants to organize our marketing and communications better. Jay Wiesenfeld has volunteered to coordinate our marketing efforts until a permanent chair is found.

The Board is moved to propose an amendment to our constitution to ease ratification of actions taken at our annual meeting; the amendment allows ratification by email or mail (currently only mail is allowed) if a quorum of 20% of our members are not in attendance at the meeting. The amendment must be ratified at the next congregational meeting.

The Board reviewed the Treasurer's Report and concerns were raised about our continuing deficits.

Jay Wiesenfeld gave the Board his last President's report. The Annual Meeting ballots were due on May 25th. Based on the received ballots, the results of the Annual Meeting have been confirmed. The Executive Committee had considered MRT participating in URJ's "Communities of Practice" initiative. After evaluating the amount of commitment, the Executive Committee decided not to move forward with this initiative this year. Red Bank YMCA expansion construction work is proceeding. The MRT Human Resources Committee has been obtaining feedback for our Clergy and Staff Members. Jay reiterates his thanks to the Board, Clergy, and Staff for their support for his work. Jay acknowledged the efforts of Mitch Baum, David Levinsky, John Heidema, Alan Levy, and Mark Gruensfelder, all of whom are leaving the Board.

Zach Gilstein gave the Board his first report as incoming President. Zach is looking forward to working with this great Board, to further our progress on our journey. He wants to make sure that all committees have clear written goals and objectives for the next year. Through the year we should focus on the next year's plan as well as a five-year plan. The key work of the Board is strategic work – the Committees perform the tactical work that provides the interesting and varied programming and activities.

Summary of July 21st Board of Trustees meeting: from Jim Halpern, MRT Recording Sec'y



The Board of Trustees met on Tuesday evening, July 21, 2015, beginning at 7 pm.

The Board acknowledges positive happenings within the congregation. The Membership committee has recently updated and revised our membership application. The Social Action Committee is gathering additional opportunities for projects with local charities. The beach service of Jun 26 was inspiring, well attended, and began with a good shofar blast. There is a flurry of summer emails boding well for upcoming activities this year. The Men's Club will engage in a clean-up of part of the Henry Hudson Trail in August. The marteff (aka lower level) has been cleaned and painted, in preparation for use as classroom space. The Adult Education and Publicity

& Marketing committees had enthusiastic first meetings of the year. MRT has had several articles in local publications already this summer.

In his President's Report, Zach Gilstein reviewed the new MRT organization roster, with VP assignments supporting various committees. He requested that each committee create a written statement of goals and objectives, which should incorporate objectives to increase connections within our MRT community. The web site has been well updated and it continually needs new and updated material, including pictures and video. All content for the web site should be submitted to Mark Gruensfelder, who is the web master for MRT, with the participation of the VP who supports the committee responsible for the content. Zach initiated a process for the Board members to create bulletin articles about other Board members, so that the congregation will become more familiar with its Board members.

Rabbi Kline led a session on strategy and branding. This continues the discussion, initiated by the Board's review of the progress implementing the Atid report, on how to put our mission into action. Marc is compiling the input from the Board about five sacred things about belonging to MRT that each Board member has proposed.

Stu Tuchband reported on the proposal to purchase 68 grave plots in the new interfaith section of the cemetery of Temple Torat-El, on Route 33 in Neptune. MRT already has 42 plots in the Jewish section of this cemetery, which have all been sold to MRT families. The Board approved a motion to negotiate the purchase of the 68 plots with Temple Torat-El.

Margie Wold reported that the library book collection has been appropriately culled and that plans for repainting the library are proceeding. Doreen Addison reported that during the High Holy Days. MRT will again open services to the wider community, as we did last year. Members will not need to present tickets, so tickets will not be sent to members. Non-members rsvp'ing to our High Holy Day invitation will be given tickets.

The Board approved the resignations of three member families, which was presented in the report of Membership chair Linda Burns.

Rabbi Kline reported that he had attended the URJ National Leadership Camp session at Camp Kutz and noted the excellent group of leaders and music leaders. He will be joining 103 other rabbis, including Rabbi Priesand, for part of a march for justice from Selma, Alabama to Washington, DC. Our rabbis will participate only for a few days—the full march will be extend through August and September. Plans for a joint Martin Luther King Friday Shabbat service with the Pilgrim Baptist Church have already begun.

Cantor has been working on many aspects of the High Holy Day services. The first three sessions from the 92^{nd} St. Y have been scheduled. The Youth advisors are planning for the upcoming year. Cantor will be in residence at Camp Harlam again this summer.

Because of the new Board positions, the authorized signers for MRT checks must be revised. The Board approved a group of four signers for MRT: President Zach Gilstein, Treasurer Stu Tuchband, Senior VP Jay Feigus, and 2nd VP Margie Wold.



From Eleanor Rubin, Israel Affairs Chair

Summertime is often a time for reading books we've not thought about before. I would like to recommend a couple of books relating to the history and personal experiences of individuals in Israel. Fair warning- these are not easy, beach books that you may enjoy reading as you loll in the sun with sounds of ocean waves flowing and ebbing. But they are books that will make you think and perhaps readjust some long held opinions.

"My Promised Land - The Triumph and Tragedy of Israel" by Ari Shavit is a beautifully written account of the author's early family origins in the Holy Land as a response to the birth of the Zionist movement. It is a heartbreaking account of the days that followed, using historical documents and interviews, letters and diaries to weave the mesmerizing narrative. Some of it is painful to read, and to learn what horrific actions were taken for the sake of establishing a home for Jews in the land. Ari Shavit has been in the United States recently speaking about his book and defending his right to tell historical truths against those who would criticize his authorship. It is an important and masterful book by a lover, though sometimes critical, of Israel.

"To the End of the Land" by David Grossman is an anti-war novel about the grief and cost of war. It is about family relationships and the refusal to face, but the inevitability of, loss. The novel is written with sensitivity and passion, always gentle and creates an unforgettable character whom you will never forget. It is very personal and a great work of literature.

"Son of Hamas" by Mosab Hassan Yousef is a gripping tale, the true story of the evolution of a young Muslim Palestinian caught up with his prominent and highly respected family whose father was a leader in Hamas, in the Israeli-Arab conflict. The book reads like an edge of the seat spy story and describes murders, incarceration, double-agent activities and near death experiences. All the while, one cares about the author and his inner thoughts, his abiding love for his family and his need to protect them. His remarkable turnabout and betrayal is a unique, and deeply human experience beautifully told and strangely easy reading.

"Menachem Begin - The Battle for Israel's Soul" by Daniel Gordis is the inside story of the rise, near fall, and ultimate rise of this refugee from a poor family living in a small town in Poland where the young man, deeply versed in Torah, though not traditionally religious, developed right-leaning positions. After being imprisoned by the Soviets for his radical beliefs, Begin arrived in Israel as a Polish soldier having served in the Free Polish Army in 1942. The great and bitter rivalry between Begin and David Ben Gurion, Israel's first Prime Minister, caused polarization of factions within Israel and throughout the Jewish diaspora. Begin, at one time labelled a terrorist who ordered the blowing up of the King David Hotel where British commanders were housed, won the Nobel Peace prize, made peace with Egypt, welcomed President Anwar Sadat to Israel and co-signed a peace treaty with him on the White House lawn in 1979. As Prime Minister, Begin reached out to Ethiopian Jews and Vietnamese boat people. He was ultimately a man of the people and was passionate about his Judaism and Israel's legacy therein. A great read.

America's Journey for Justice—Join Rabbi Kline on August 17th

The NAACP, is conjunction with faith-based and other communities, is calling for the formation of a broad coalition to march from Selma to Washington, DC beginning August 1, 2015. The journey takes place in a five-state relay format in which each state participates in a portion of the journey to dramatize the need for state level reform in the areas of voting rights, labor and employment rights, public education, and criminal justice. Participants may set how many miles they want to walk each day and can ride the bus for the remainder of the journey.

The march will go through Alabama, Georgia, South and North Carolina and Virginia. These states have implemented voter identification laws and shortened periods for early voting.

Each day marchers will walk approximately 18-20 miles.


