Every year around this time I ask "Do you know what Shavuot is?" after several answers one student usually remembers, "Oh, that's when we celebrate Confirmation." After all these years a person might give up...however I am a woman of great faith! Once again I write about Shavuot with hope.

Shavu'ot, means "the Festival of Weeks", it is the second of the three Biblical festivals (the other two are Passover and Sukkot). Everyone remembers Sukkot and being in a Sukkah, Passover because of the Seder, but what do we do on Shavuot? It is a harvest holiday which commemorates

the time when the first fruits were harvested and brought to the ancient Temple and is also known as Hag ha-Bikkurim (the Festival of the First Fruits). Later it came to be a celebration of the giving of the Torah at Mount Sinai which is also called Chag Matan Torah.

The weeks from Passover to Shavu'ot is counted. We call this the counting of the Omer. We begin the count from the second day of Passover to the day before Shavu'ot, which is 49 days or 7 full weeks. Shavu'ot is sometimes called Pentecost, because it falls on the 50th day. The counting reminds us of the important connection between Passover and Shavu'ot: Passover freed us physically from slavery, but the giving of the Torah on Shavu'ot redeemed us from the idols of ancient Egypt. Realizing since Shavuot has four names, this may be why everyone gets confused.

It is important to remember that Shavuot is called the time of the *giving* of the Torah, rather than the time of the *receiving* of the Torah. The sages point out that we are constantly in the process of receiving the Torah-we receive it every day, but it was first given at this time.

It is customary to stay up the entire first night of Shavu'ot to study Torah. Some eat a dairy meal at least once during Shavu'ot; cheese blintzes and cheesecake are traditional Shavuot dishes. Some say it is a reminder of the promise of Israel leading us to a land flowing with "milk and honey." The Book of Ruth is read during Shavuot. Shavuot is a meaningful Jewish festival, but often the least remembered. At MRT Shavuot is a very worthwhile time to attend Confirmation on June 12th at 10 am and learn from our 10th graders who will become our confirmands. Families with children in Religious School should make every effort to attend our Confirmation service together as a family.

On June 3rd we celebrate our final First Friday of the school year followed by a pot luck dinner. We will call you to the Bima if you are celebrating a June birthday or anniversary and for a special blessing over children attending URJ summer programs and those graduating High School. Please come to our visual prayer service Seeds of Spirituality, SOS on June 17th and meet us at the beach on June 24th for our last Shabbat in June!

One of my regrets as a teenager is that I was not able to attend Confirmation at my temple when I was in 10th grade. At the end of 1968, my family moved to the Washington, DC area. Summary of April 19th Board of Trustees meeting: Jim Halpern, Recording Secretary



MRT participating in the Red Bank Street Fair on April 10th. Thanks to everyone who helped represent us there and get the word out about MRT. (The chocolate covered matzah went fast.) This past month everyone had a great time at our Purim Carnival and we are now busy preparing for Passover. Our Second Night Seder will be held on April 23rd. Adult Ed sponsored an Author Book Talk with Larry Roth, for "The Nazi Account". Adult Ed reports that plans are underway for the Shabbat Kallah event on Saturday, May 7 with Rabbi Uri Regev. Men's Club raised over \$200 for our school at their "HeBREW Fest". They are also getting things organized for the upcoming Mother's Day Brunch on May 8th. Sisterhood held our "Women's Seder" on April 10th.

The Board voted to approve the resignation of one family from out Congregation who will be moving to Florida. Our Congregation now has 311 family memberships.

The Finance Committee made their presentation to the Board for our 2016/2017 Budget. This budget focuses on goals the Board would like to achieve. First, to present the budget in a simple direct manner so members can understand the relationship between our mission as a Temple and our budget. Second, to direct more funds to our Religious School, because the Board feels that the education of our children is one of our most important missions. The Board voted to approve this budget for publication. The Budget will be presented for approval at our annual meeting in May.

In his president's report, Zach Gilstein asked the Board to prepare their presentations for the report that will be presented at the annual meeting. Zach discussed with the Board his recent experiences attending a program sponsored by the Federation for creating a program for Life and Legacy Giving. While our annual pledges help fund the operations on a year to year basis, Zach would like to start a program where members work to fund endowments to the Temple so that we can develop longer term programs that will fulfill our mission statement. Zach reported to the Board the recent request for helping in our shortfall of funds raised over \$38,000 which will help balance our current budget.

The Board voted to allow our youth group "SMARTY" to paint and decorate the Youth Lounge in the Marteff using their own ideas and designs.

The Nominating Committee presented the final slate of candidates for open offices at MRT that will be voted on at our annual meeting.

Rabbi Kline was happy to report to the Board that we had many B'nai Mitzvot this month. We will have a short Shabbat Service before the first Seder this year. We will also be having a special service on May 5th in remembrance of Yom Ha Shoah. One May 1st we will have a special presentation from the scribe who is repairing our Holocaust Torah. Congregants who attend, will get the honor of the opportunity to write a letter in the scroll under the scribe's supervision. Our teachers' Shabbat service will be on May 13th.

Cantor Clissold commended our choir who has been singing during more Shabbat services this year. On May 20th will be our next Seed of Spirituality Shabbat Service. If you have not attended, you should come and see the beautiful multimedia presentation that raises our worship to a new level. Our Youth Advisers have both agreed to stay on for another year, Rose Schreck and Amy Greenberg. Our Youth Committee has meet with them several times this year. We have had a great year and are working on the next year! This summer will be the Cantor's 7th year of working for our temple youth at our URJ regional camp-Camp Harlam.

Our Annual Meeting took place this month. The presentations outlined the many events and accomplishments of the past year, as well as our goals and challenges we will face in the coming year. New members were elected to the Board of Trustees and our budget passed. Both of these events are subject to a ratification by all members of our congregation which will be sent to congregants soon. Information about the meeting can be found on our Temple website and in our temple office.

We honored the teachers of our religious school at a Shabbat service. Sisterhood had an "out and about" dinner at the new Huddy's in Colts Neck. Sisterhood, along with the Men's Club,

hosted our Community Seder on the Second night of Passover. A service was held to commemorate Yom Hashoah. Our Shoah Torah had a dedication ceremony and was added to a place of honor in our Ark. The Arts and Deco Committee reframed all of the confirmation pictures in the hallway with special frames. Live streaming of Shabbat Services and our B'nai Mitzvot are being well received.

Mitzvah Day is Sunday, May 22nd. Please plan on coming and helping out on projects that make the world a little better, a little more beautiful and more peaceful. Eighty families have signed up so far and your efforts can help those that really need a hand. Tikkun Olam.

In his president's report, Zach Gilstein discussed with the Board recent actions in creating a program for Life and Legacy Giving. A committee has been formed to help coordinate this effort and to meet with those interested in creating an endowment for the future of our temple. Zach reported his plans for orienting newly elected Board members to begin their work on the Board of Trustees. Zach also thanked those Board members who will be retiring from the Board in June, Bonnie Klein, Rachel Placitella, Jay Goldberg, Doreen Laperdon-Addison, Jill Austin and myself, for their service and hard work.

Rabbi Kline reported that as the Religious School Year is winding down, he has noticed the improved atmosphere of the children who are enjoying the experience. He thanked Bonnie Klein, Monica Schneider-Brewer and Karen Seligman for their hard work in providing guidance to the school. He offered special thanks to Stephanie Fields, our principal for her work and is looking forward to planning the next school year with her. Confirmation is on June 12th and Rabbi Kline is asking everyone to attend this service and help celebrate this important event with our young adults.

Cantor Clissold reported next year's planning is underway for our youth groups. Our choir sang this past Shabbat for Teacher Appreciation Shabbat and is now beginning to prepare for the High Holy Days. There has been much positive feedback having the choir sing all year. The Cantor attended the Camp Harlam faculty meeting in Westfield, NJ. We now have 8 children attending URJ Summer programs: Harlam, Eisner, OSRUI, Sci Tech and Kutz. Next year Stephanie Fields will be helping organize a "Camp Day" in religious school to boost awareness of parents and children about the incredible opportunity of attending a URJ Camp. Our Seeds of Spirituality Shabbat service is this Friday and is based on the incredible and provoking images of international graffiti. Services begin at 7 pm.

The Board voted to approve requesting a \$50,000 loan from the Trustees of our Endowment Funds to make some much needed building repairs. These funds will go toward replacing part of our roof, replacing a broken furnace in the Sanctuary and to repair our parking lot.

As per contract, the Board and Rabbi are obligated to inform each other of their intent to renew the Rabbi's contract one year prior to the end of the contract which will end in June 2017. In executive session, the Board voted unanimously to notify Rabbi Kline that we intend to renew his contract for a term of at least three years.

The next best ingredient to the gardening basics of sun, water and warm temperatures is volunteers. This year's Mitzvah Day did not disappoint. The organizers put together an array of social action projects and our temple members embraced the opportunity to serve the community. MRT'S Gan Mazon/Garden of Plenty was the beneficiary of temple members ranging in age from a few months shy of eighty to a recent bar mitzvah celebrant. The fifteen Mitzvah Day helpers definitely boosted the spirits of our five regular volunteers, three of whom are not temple members. My lofty goals for the day were all accomplished. Due to the tilling the week preceding Mitzvah Day by Brett Tuller, the volunteers were able to work as soon as they arrived.

Plenty was accomplished with help from volunteers who brought their shovels, trowels, gloves and positive attitudes. Twenty pounds of lettuce and broccoli were harvested (and delivered the following morning to Open Door of Freehold). Forty tomato plants were planted and staked. The planting beds were covered with several layers of newspaper and salt hay was spread over the newspaper to retard weed growth and virus imbedded in the soil from spreading. A brave soul removed poison ivy actively growing along the fencing. Another was in charge of weed disposal.

In my April Bulletin article, I wrote the following: "Luckily for MRT and the many Monmouth County residents who depend on our produce for their fresh vegetables, several colleagues from the Master Gardener Association of Monmouth County have agreed to bring their expertise to Gan Mazon for the upcoming season. Although not members of our temple, they endorse our community garden model and appreciate the dedication our temple volunteers have shown for Gan Mazon and the non-sectarian pantries it supports. I expect to learn much from my friends and I know that temple members will too regardless of current skill levels."

The Master Gardeners did not stand on ceremony. They did not just supervise and direct. Sue Malmi brought her expertise to teach the proper method for the harvesting of lettuce and broccoli, and then turned to tomato planting. Another MG colleague, Gloria Gross brought her considerable horticultural knowledge to our garden; on Sunday she directed volunteers to tend to the rhubarb and leeks that she planted several weeks ago. Sue and Gloria planted the lettuce and broccoli. (The brave soul removing the poison ivy was temple member Elizabeth "Elmo" Cohen, also a MGA member.) Look out for the trellises that will be built by Gloria and her husband, Charlie, for our two cucumber rows.

HOLIDAY IN ISRAEL



I arrived on Yom Ha'atzmaut, May 12, Independence Day, a day of celebration, Barbecue Day. Israelis compare it to our Fourth of July. The national holiday brings thousands of people to local parks where families make their own barbecued meals in company with neighbors or strangers wishing to join in the communal sense of the special day. Lots of smoke is in the air.

I enjoyed a private barbecue with my family in their garden in a suburb of Jerusalem while the neighborhood resounded with blasts of music accompanied by singing and dancing in the streets marking the holiday until late in the evening. The next day, our Shabbat services were occasionally accompanied by sounds of chanting of the muezzin's call from a distant mosque, several kilometers away in the Arab town of Azaria. This occurs 5 times a day. The mix of cultures, languages, religions and various streams of Judaism often marked by dress codes, makes for a colorful, vibrant, energetic atmosphere, full of creativity, angst and joy.

68 years after the founding of the State of Israel by virtue of a United Nations declaration, the country has much to be proud of. Various newspapers list their 68 reasons to respect if not love Israel. We all know about Israel's superiority in technology that has brought advances in medicine, agriculture, communication and more throughout the world.
