YOM KIPPUR HEALING SERVICE Yom Kippur Afternoon—Wednesday, October 12th 3pm-4:30pm Conducted by Doreen Laperdon-Addison

The Healing Service provides a quiet space and time for reflection, meditation, movement and prayer in a supportive, nurturing, and safe environment. This service is open to everyone, those personally going through physical, mental or emotional life challenges and health issues or who have loved ones, friends and family members facing health and other life situations who are in need of healing.

SIN, GUILT, SHAME, and EMOTIONAL HEALING A Three Session Discussion Series Starting Yom Kippur Afternoon Yom Kippur Afternoon—Wednesday, October 12th 3pm-4:30pm Discussion series led by Elliott Familant (efamiliant@gmail.com)

During the Days of Awe, we spend a lot of time hearing about sin and repentance but these terms are problematic in these days where we make everything a pathology. This discussion group will explore these topics in a guided but relatively free form discussion group.

Session 1: The Problem of Sin-Yom Kippur Afternoon at 3pm

The Stanford University rape case illustrates part of the problem. The case that received notoriety because of the unusually light sentence that the defendant received was exacerbated by the failure of the defendant to take responsibility for his actions. Instead he blamed it on a campus atmosphere that tolerates binge drinking and sexual promiscuity. His implicit message? "My actions were excusable because of the environment I (unfortunately) found myself in." But where is his acceptance of personal responsibility in all this?

This case is not unique. It occurs in a culture where actions which used to be called sins are now excused as the products of mitigating circumstances, cultural norms or misguided childhood rearing practices (remember the teenager who received a light sentence for a drunk driving manslaughter conviction because of a childhood that was characterized as one in which the parents "never set limits for the boy and gave him everything he wanted" so called affluenza). Where the deadly sins of lust, greed, and gluttony, are now construed as psychological maladies, addictions to sex, money and food.

If everything is a product of our environment or the unfortunate outcome of a psychiatric problem, what exactly are we atoning for on Yom Kippur? How do we reconcile the more sophisticated conceptions of human behavior brought about by modern psychological science with our more traditional notions of sin? During session one of this series we we grapple with these issues.

Session 2: Guilt And Shame—Sunday, October 30th from 7-8pm

If personal responsibility still has a role in the way we think about ourselves, how does our response determine what happens to our lives next? We frequently talk about guilt and shame as if they are interchangeable concepts. They are not. One can lead to personal growth and allows us to move on with our lives. The other can easily lead to self doubt, anger, depression and inaction. One way to find out how we typically respond is to take a self evaluation test. In the second part of this discussion, we will have the opportunity to take a test specifically designed to uncover how we tend to respond when we do something wrong. We will discuss why guilt can be good (if not to excess) and shame is bad and discuss strategies for dealing with these feelings in an effective and growth promoting way.

Session 3: Emotional Healing—Sunday, November 13th from 7-8pm

Both Jewish tradition and psychological research point to the importance of forgiveness and repentance in the healing process. In this last session we will explore repentance and forgiveness as tools for promoting emotional healing. We will look at the kinds of responses you can have when someone does something to you and you don't forgive them. What happens to you when you live with lingering feelings for a long time. How does forgiveness (even if the perpetrator does not apologize and does not repent) help you to make your life better. We will look at effective and ineffective ways to forgive. We will then look at the flip side and look at apologies and repentance. There are effective apologies and ineffective apologies. Knowing the difference can mean the difference between a good outcome and one that is not. We will look at examples of each and look at the five components that are present in effective apologies. Finally, we will consider forgiveness and repentance in the context of spiritual and personal development.

The High Holidays are nearly upon us, and once again we will be celebrating Tashlich, one of my favorite Jewish rituals. The centerpiece of the Tashlich ritual is the literal casting of sins, often in the form of breadcrumbs, into bodies of flowing water. In this way, we echo God's actions in Micah 7:19: "You will cast all their sins into the depths of the sea." At MRT, this will take place immediately following the Family Service at 4PM on Rosh Hashanah, October 3rd.

Dropping a few grams of breadcrumbs from my pockets seems to lift tons of weight from my soul. The sins which have been weighing down my footsteps and my psyche are – all too temporarily – cast off. If only I could live sin- and guilt-free the rest of the year... but unfortunately I always seem to fall short of my ideals.

One of the goals of the Ritual committee for this year is to find new ways to engage our community in ritual practices. Past innovations have included the wonderful Seeds of Spirituality(TM) services, which have allowed us to use our Friday night worship service to explore particular themes, such as Family, and Liminality; and our ability to live-stream services, so that those who are physically unable to attend services are still able to connect with our communal prayers. We hope to continue this experimentation in order to better fulfill the spiritual needs of the congregation.

Gan Mazon Already Surpassed Its All-time Total Harvest

As of today, September 22, Gan Mazon delivered a combined 1,085 lbs. to the Jewish Family & Children's Service of Greater Monmouth County in Asbury Park and to the Freehold Open Door Food Pantry ---surpassing our all-time high reached last season at 1,055 lbs. Gan Mazon's Thursday morning harvest is delivered weekly to the JF&CS by temple member Judy Rivkin ---approximately 550 lbs. in the last five weeks.

For this month's Bulletin article, I spoke with the Executive Director of the JF&CS, Paul Freedman, to find out the criteria to receive food assistance and the procedure for the distribution of dry groceries and produce to agency clients. I was frankly pleased that JF&CS accepts people at their word that they have low incomes and are in need of help providing nutritious meals for their families or themselves. The agency requires a proof of residence, but will make allowances when proof cannot be given. I learned that rules under which pantries operate are not uniform throughout the county.

On Thursdays, volunteers at JF&CS pack 35 bags of dry groceries for distribution on Friday morning. Clients line up about two hours before the pantry opens with the first 35 families given one bag previously packed and a second bag of "wet" items such as eggs, produce, frozen chicken and fish. The actual contents from week to week depend on what the pantry has in stock. Paul informed me that 600 people, 160-180 families, receive approximately 3,000 meals monthly, half going to children. Clients obtain their food allotment once monthly from JF&CS and other pantries on alternate weeks. I received the impression that although not perfect, the system works and food is available in the county.

JF&CS is able to purchase food from the FoodBank of Monmouth and Ocean Counties when donations are low. The agency pays \$.18/lb. for persons qualifying under state guidelines and no charge for clients qualifying under federal rules. Costs seem low, but total purchases amount to around \$40,000 annually. Paul is adamant that families receive fresh vegetables every week and is grateful for MRT's commitment to provide them. MRT is the only large garden supplying JF&CS with produce.

Readers of my column should be familiar with the dedication of Master Gardeners Gloria Gross and Sue Malmi to Gan Mazon. In addition to their labor and extended horticultural knowledge, these ladies have also added many, many pounds of vegetables from their home gardens to the totals from Gan Mazon. While not members of MRT, Gloria and Sue are repairing the world by feeding the needy one cucumber, pepper, squash, tomatillo, and tomato at a time; and, they do not care who gets the credit.

I encourage MRT families with home gardens to add a row or two next season and combine the produce harvested with Gan Mazon's. My guess is that hundreds of additional pounds for the needy would be the result.

I am working to achieve the rank of Eagle Scout, the highest rank of the Boy Scouts of America. This rank is achieved by less than 5% of all boys that join Scouting. Along with scout and temple volunteers, we will be building ten benches and beautifying the garden for my Eagle Scout Project. These benches will be made out of pressure treated wood that is safe to sit on. They will be six feet long, which can accommodate about three or four people.





I am doing this because I feel that the prayer/meditation garden is a very underutilized area. For this project, most of the materials have been graciously donated by Builder's General in Little Silver. I will be relying on volunteers from Boy Scouts as well as the temple to help build the benches and complete the project. We plan to have adults cut and pre drill the wood on October 1st at 3 p.m. at my house and have everyone clean up the area and assemble the benches on October 9th at 9:00 a.m. at the temple. 




