I am pleased to report that we have promises from 18 charter members of our Legacy Giving Circle, which includes people who commit a contribution to an MRT endowment in their will or trust or who make a contribution to one now. This is an initiative we began about a year ago with training from the Grinspoon Foundation, which helps Jewish organizations around the country start these programs to help sustain their missions into the future. With our achievement of 18 members, the Grinspoon Foundation will be awarding Monmouth Reform Temple a \$7500 gift.

Our committee, which includes Bob St. Lifer, Eleanor Rubin, Joel Morgovsky, Rabbi Kline, and me, has been slowly calling on many people to introduce the program and ask for support.

But there is no need to wait for us to get around to you. Feel free to reach out to any one of us if you would like to know more about the program or make a promise. We will achieve another award when we have our next 18 Legacy Circle Members.

As I mentioned in my High Holy Day remarks, I am interested in establishing an endowment for MRT Religious Education. We have progressed this with a draft of a Religious School Endowment Trust Agreement and have identified a few members who have agreed to act as trustees. I expect to have this in place by the Annual Meeting in early May.

I mentioned last month that the Board had reviewed the proposed guidelines of the Member Role Policy Task Force on how MRT can be an even more inclusive environment for all of our members. One area that required further consideration is which, if any, Board positions should be open to all members. The Board was surveyed about this and will discuss it at the upcoming February Board meeting. Look for announcements of a couple of congregational meetings to review the proposed guidelines, gather feedback, and answer questions later this month and in early April.

Huge thanks to Cantor Clissold for all the work being done to create another rousing Purim Spiel. Please join us for the Spiel and a great social night of deli and appropriate Purim revelry. Spotlight on our Board

Stephen Gaudette by Kerry Krachman



I had the pleasure of meeting Stephen Gaudette for a cup of Dunkin Donuts coffee and one of his self-confessed weaknesses sugar--this time in the form of donuts. Steve was still excited about the Broadway musical—*Get on Your Feet*, that he and Cheryl had seen the night before. He was also sporting a tan from his recent vacation on a Windstar Sailing Yacht in the Caribbean.

Steve Gaudette is someone who always smiles as he speaks. He hardly hesitated when asked to list his top three passions in rank order: sailing, model steam engines—some of which he has built, and tinkering in his home shop. Speaking of home—Steve's home is now an expanded cape with two stories, three bedrooms and two baths—all of which he built over time.

Now retired, Steve worked in maintenance and engineering, utilizing his chosen profession as an Industrial Manufacturing Engineer. He grew up in Norwell, Massachusetts a town 25 miles southeast of Boston. While attending Northeastern University, he met Cheryl who later became his wife and contributed to Steve's decision to relocate to the New York metropolitan area and to convert to Judaism.

Steve and his family came to MRT after belonging to another local Temple close to their home where their children attended religious school and had their Bar and Bat Mitzvah's. They found themselves wondering if they might find another congregation in the area where they would feel more connected. Steve and Cheryl explored other Temples—they even explored a Unitarian church.

When Steve and Cheryl entered Monmouth Reform Temple about 15 years ago, they knew that they had finally found the congregation they were seeking. They were warmly welcomed by a number of people—all of whom were unknown to them. As their granddaughter Ilana started attending religious school, they found themselves again active and involved in their synagogue connecting to the Temple's mission of Tikkun Olam.

Steve is currently serving on the Temple Board as House Chair his second term as House Chair—having first served under Stephanie Fitzsimmons. He has an eye for detail and takes pride in making sure that the Temple's facilities and grounds reflect caring and attention—believing strongly that this projects the dedication of Temple members to potential new members and the community. Steve also takes his role as a member of the Temple Board seriously feeling strongly about the trust placed in him and all the Board members that all are stewards of every aspect of MRT.

When asked what his top priorities are—Steve responded –more vacations and to enjoy his retirement. In addition to his strong participation as an MRT trustee, Steve is very active and enjoys hiking, biking and sailing. He hiked 50 miles through Yellowstone National Park, biked through the Black Hills of South Dakota and hopes to check-off one item on his self-proclaimed "huge bucket list"—hiking in Death Valley, California.

Steve and Cheryl have three children—two sons and a daughter and 5 grandchildren ranging in age from 8 to 17 years. When not executing his responsibilities as MRT's House Chair, you can find Steve puttering in his shop, driving Illana to and from MRT, sailing in good weather, helping Cheryl with her work at Family Resource Associates and always adding items to his growing bucket list.

From Eleanor Rubin, Israel Affairs Chair

ISRAEL: A Land of Contrasts

Just having returned from a whirlwind tour of southern Israel, these two communities stand out and offer a look into the challenging, but promising future of Israeli society.

I spent a couple of days in the Negev and visited an area in Lachish, population 6000, specifically in a town called Eliav. Why would anyone move to an area in the desert where neighboring towns are a distance away, where there are long distance commutes to any city, where there is a dearth of local

employment opportunities, and difficulties starting new business? The answer is that some young Israeli families, yearning to live in a place of beauty, away from the busy cities, choose to live in new affordable homes with yards and gardens for their children to play in, and to join a community of like-minded neighbors. They have chosen to settle in the desert and strive to succeed through creativity and communal problem solving. The homes, by the way, are very attractive and reminded me of Mexican, adobe architecture.

A young mother of 4, a successful lawyer who does much of her work from home with the blessings of technology, has an idea that a business hub for startups, an actual physical place to perform office-type work could benefit those with special skills who cannot or wish not to travel long distances to a 9-5 job. The business hub could benefit those with creative ideas that require administrative assistance. It would allow women, "second salary" partners and child care parents to find a way to grow economically without sacrificing at home responsibilities.

The young woman, the originator of the idea, has full support of her community, and I have no doubt that this start-up will succeed as others have in this start-up nation. The result will be that families will chose to stay in the area and success will bring more families to help inhabit the Negev.

The Bedouin towns of Al Said and Hura, population 23,000, pose a different kind of challenge. Of the 23,000, 89% are under the age of 45. In the Young Adult Center in Hura, there is a plan which focuses on preparing high school graduates for higher education. As we know, Jewish Israelis spend 2 or 3 years after high school in military service or national service where they gain skills, discipline and maturity. College acceptance for many takes place after a year of travel so that Israelis entering college may be 23 or 24 years old. Bedouins, most of whom do not serve in the army, may enter college at the age of 18 or 19 which may put them at a disadvantage. The plan at the Hura Center includes providing young people with good skills and a sufficient level of Hebrew and English. It prepares students for the Psychometric exam (Israeli version of the SAT) and organizes transportation to academic institutions and assists young people to overcome financial barriers.

The Bedouin community, made up of many tribes, is the fastest growing population in the country. We met two young ladies who are about to start their studies at Sapir College. They are 18 and 19 years old. One of them told us that she has 44 siblings. A Jewish Israeli who is part of the program feels strongly that Israelis have a responsibility to help improve the educational and employment opportunities for the Bedouin communities. There has been a suggestion of instituting a "gap" year during which they may do volunteer work in the community. This will enable a better educational experience and provide a measure of maturity.

Asked how their families felt about these young women going off to college, one replied that she had to promise that she would not marry until she finished her degree.
