# FROM RABBI MARC KLINE

Yom Hodu sameach! Literally, this translates two ways. The first, and more common, is Happy Turkey Day (Thanksgiving)! November is the month of this great holiday in American culture. Yes, we have whitewashed the holiday a little. I am not completely sure that the Pilgrims and “Indians” were that cozy, or that the Pilgrims had much respect for the life, well-being, or dignity of the indigenous population. However, folklore reminds us that we should find a way to share and get along ... and build community, whatever the original story. I do not like the history, I love the attempt at positive lesson building.

The second translation for Yom Hodu sameach is “Happy Day for Giving Thanks.” Hodu means turkey and thanks, depending on context. Whether this dual reality had anything to do with the confluence of both in this holiday, I have no idea ... but it works. It also allows me to think of the Rabbinic story where Rabbi Eliezer greets his pupils who have a question to ask. “Rabbi, how does one know when one is supposed to atone?” He replied, “You are supposed to clean everything up one day before you die.” Immediately, the students responded, “How does one know when that will happen?” The sage Rabbi said, “You do not know, therefore atone every day. Greet people with appreciation every day. Celebrate living every day. Each may be your last.” Hence, every day is, or should be, a Yom Hodu Sameach.

So, I hope that Turkey Day brings all the joy for which we might pray. I hope that our families come together to enjoy each other. More importantly, I hope that we find ways in which we can better appreciate each other better every day.

## FROM RELIGIOUS SCHOOL PRINCIPAL STEPHANIE FEILDS



Building community through multiple avenues to enliven Jewish education is a continued goal of the Religious School in 5778. With 110 registered students in the school, 18 consecrants, 2 senior-year interns, & 3 in our pilot Keshet Kids program we have a lot for which to be thankful. The school has adopted the motto “MRT: We are Mindful and Respectful of our Traditions” and is focusing on that during Kehilah (community) building particularly with our 4th-7th graders.

Keshet Kids is a transitional program for Pre-K (4-year-old) children and their parents. The first half hour is with Bagels & Blocks. Then children head to their own classroom to spend an hour with a teacher followed by our play-based Jewish curriculum. This program is \$100 for the year and open to anyone raising a Jewish child. Registration is required.

We are proud to support & grow our children in every way. Two of our seniors, Ilana Gaudette and Rachel Kline, applied for and were accepted as interns this year. They take on more responsibility in the running of the classroom, & preparation work for the day. All of our madrichim are spending the year learning about Sean

Covey’s 7 Habits of Highly Effective Teens as the school strives to develop our children Jewishly & to be effective adults.

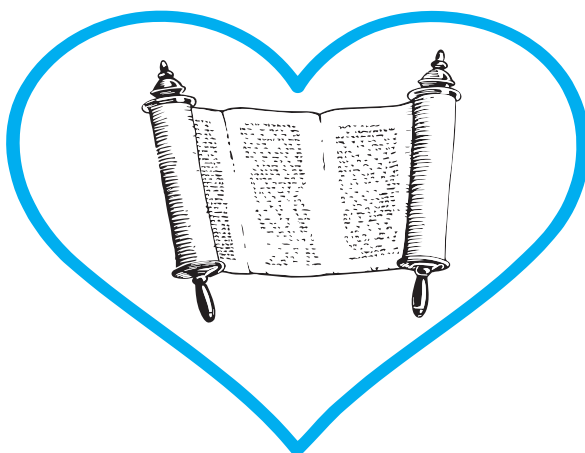

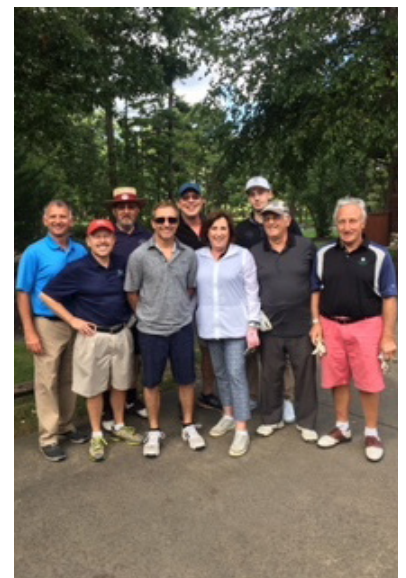

# FROM GAN MAZON – MRT'S GARDEN OF PLENTY



It should be no secret that Gan Mazon is getting a new fence: Deer and burrowing small animals have forced the fence's replacement. A volunteer team recently turned out to install the new 8 ft. posts. Our project director, Brett Tuller, is shown working to extend previously installed posts. Special thanks to Steve Kennedy who saw the need for a new fence last season and started the project on his own.

The new fence's dimensions will measure 110 ft. x 27 ft. x 8 ft., enclosing 2,970 sq. ft., 970 sq. ft. larger than is currently under cultivation. The addition of the grassy area between the existing two gardens and adjustments to their 25-ft. x 42-ft. and 20 ft. x 25- ft. dissimilar dimensions account for the increased

footage. It is expected that the grassy area will remain for collecting produce, weighing, and other gardening responsibilities. Gan Mazon is looking for angels to finance the fence installation.

## **Please volunteer to work in the garden on Mitzvah Day---Sunday, October 29.**

Our task will be to remove the existing 284 ft. of fencing, a job that must be done before the new fencing can be attached. The Mitzvah Day portal is on the temple's home page. Remember: removing the old fence is a hard job for the few, an easy one for the many.

Gan Mazon has gardening tools. To ensure that no one must wait for a tool, it would be helpful if volunteers brought a shovel and a long-handled rake, however, none are required. Put your name, tape or some other identifying mark on your tools. If the weather report predicts a sunny day, I suggest that all volunteers wear hats and sun screen. Gloves would be advisable. Suitable for volunteers 14+.



I am often asked why the produce from MRT'S vegetable garden is harvested and delivered on Thursday mornings instead of Sunday mornings when more volunteers are available. Since Gan Mazon volunteers often tend the garden on Sundays but not harvest, the paradox seems more puzzling. The answer is that our harvest timetable is predicated on the distribution schedule of the pantry or pantries supported by Gan Mazon in any given season. Our principal recipient for this season and last has been the Jewish Family and Children's Service of Greater Monmouth County; its food distribution center is in Asbury Park. JF&CS receives food donations on Thursdays and distributes on Friday mornings. The agency does not have refrigerated storage, and therefore, cannot accept Gan Mazon's produce on Sundays. More importantly, JF&CS follows a philosophy that is in accord with Gan Mazon's: its pantry is non-sectarian and all delivered produce is given to its clients. Also, JF&CS needs MRT; Gan Mazon is the only large-scale garden that supplies its pantry with fresh produce---with deliveries in season of 80 lbs. to 200 lbs. weekly.

With the above said, the previous question is no less valid. Once the harvesting season begins, we rarely have enough volunteers on Thursday mornings to harvest and tend to maintenance chores. A plan to make better use of Sunday volunteers is needed. Suggestions are invited.

**A record to report:** As of October 6, Gan Mazon raised 930.50 lbs. with Gloria Gross contributing 492.50 lbs. from her garden for a total of 1,423.00 lbs. I am curious how much our last major harvest of butternut squash will add to our season's total. Happy gardening, David Levinsky // davidlevinsky@optonline.net

## FROM ISRAEL AFFAIRS CHAIR ELEANOR RUBIN

---



“Tzedaka may not save us, but it makes us worth saving.” We think of the word tzedaka as meaning “charity” but we know it means “justice”. How come? Because tzedaka is the feminine form of the word tzedek, justice in Hebrew. We are fully and constantly made aware of Israel as a nation full of contradictions. Is it a Jewish nation? for all Jews or only certain Jews? is it a democracy? the only one in the Middle East? Is it the home of Jews who live all over the world? Are we all welcome there? Do we care?

It is a nation of great technological advances that benefit all the world, from medical advances developed in their laboratories to inventions that can solve problems in agriculture to developing a water source in desert areas. Israel is, as coined by the late Shimon Peres, a “Start-Up” nation where innovation is encouraged, while at the same time integrating thousands of refugees from all over the world, unearthing and preserving ancient artifacts that reveal our history. But there is yet another facet of Israeli organizational life and that is international charitable work. Work that is essential to save lives and promote justice.

This exemplifies Israeli ethical culture which is expressed in certain charitable organizations, in this instance, particularly by the organization called IsraAID which, in the name of justice, provides charity in the form of help, assistance, and rebuilding. IsraAID is an Israeli based humanist aid agency that responds to emergency crises and engages in international development. For the past 15 years, it has been helping people all over the world to overcome extreme crises and has provided millions with the support needed to move from destruction to reconstruction and eventually to sustainable living.

Examples of areas where IsraAID workers and volunteers have responded to needs are in Fiji, after Cyclone Winston, the 2nd strongest land-falling cyclone in recorded history. IsraAID has been in Sierra Leone, Philippines, South Sudan, Japan, Haiti, Kenya, Jordan, and United States. Since 2015, IsraAID has been sending relief, clean-up, rehabilitation to areas in the U.S. that have been exposed to extreme weather. They were present in October, 2012 when Superstorm Sandy hit and devastated our local area and beyond and they were present when tornadoes swept through Oklahoma in May, 2013.

In the wake of superstorm Harvey that hit Houston it was announced by MK Naftali Bennett who holds Diaspora Affairs portfolio that Israel would provide 1 Million dollars in aid to Houston’s Jewish community for clean-up and rehabilitation and IsraAID is again in Mexico after the 7.1 magnitude earthquake. Since May of 2017 they are working in Libya to reduce gender based violence.

In recent years, Germany has received more than 1 million asylum seekers who made the treacherous journeys from war-torn Middle East nations seeking refuge. With the request of Germany, IsraAID deployed a team of Arabic and English speaking psycho-social specialists to help with the refugees who suffer from severe mental anguish and physical disease.

In Haiti, since the earthquake in 2010, when thousands died, thousands were injured and 2 million lost their homes, IsraAID has been present working to establish improved access to education, economic development, mental health, etc. Of course there are some nations that will not permit an Israeli organization to enter the land for any reason.

IsraAID, through its history of successful humanitarian work has acquired many co-sponsors including Jewish Federations in the U.S., American Jewish Committee, Habitat for Humanity, Ben Gurion University, International Rescue Society and many more.

Without Israeli assistance, parts of the world may not perish but would surely be worse off. These organizations, part of our Israeli family, deserve our thanks and our support.
