The first is the **Center In Asbury Park** that **serves people with HIV/AIDS throughout the county**. We buy gifts for extremely needy adults who are in shelters, group homes or homeless in some way.

A sponsor is given basic information and asked to give only one wrapped box with needed items. I will give more detailed information on how this works to those who are interested. In the past years we have sponsored over 40 adults who seldom receive gifts and are so appreciative.

The second is to help struggling families through **Family Resource Associates (FRA) in Red Bank**. FRA services **babies and young children with disabilities and their families**. As of now, we have 41 children/ families who are in significant need. Volunteers can share families and children have enjoyed picking out gifts for other little ones. FROM THE RABBI

"HODU L'ADONAI KI TOV!"

Most normally these words of the Hallel psalms translate to read, "Give thanks to God, for God is Good." Hodu also is the Hebrew word for turkey. One of the first Hebrew puns I learned, "HODU L'ADONAI KI TOV! – Give turkey to god for it is good." This proof, of course, proves that Thanksgiving is a Biblical holiday. Yes, I know, people point to Sukkot (the fall harvest festival) as the paradigm for the Pilgrim celebration, but I think it is too tenuous and superficial a connection. Then it has to be about the turkey? Not quite, especially since I gave up eating meat and fowl. There is more to Thanksgiving than the roasted, fried, smoked, or otherwise prepared turkey.

What links Thanksgiving, and every cultural, religious, or national celebration to the Hallel is the concept of thanks. For every celebration we

acknowledge a cause to express thanks. I fear that sometimes we take giving thanks for granted. Sometimes we receive a gift, but it not being what we wanted, we fail to remember that the heart that gave the gift is not to be measured by our like or dislike of the gift. I remember, as a child, I would take my grandmother's jewelry and wrap it up to give back to her. Each time, she treated it as if it was the first time she ever saw the piece and loved that her little grandson would love her enough to give her this jewelry. We take for granted that we get dinner every day, and for so many, the Thanksgiving meal is just another meal with a special menu and a few extra mouths to feed. Forgetting the mythology of the holiday's origin, we do need to be especially thankful that we have food and shelter; that family and friends want to gather with us; and that we are not alone. We each know the stories of the too many people who cannot celebrate one or more of these blessings any day of the year, never mind on big holidays.

On Rosh Hashanah morning, I asked us to restore the fire on our altar of faith. The task and journey begin with appreciating the blessings in our lives. Let's spend some time this month being so thankful that we do or and give more to each other.

From Israel Affairs Chair Eleanor Rubin

ISRAEL, A LAND OF DIVERSITY
FALL 2019

In Israel, a state about the size of New Jersey, there are hundreds of different languages and dialects spoken by its citizens. Hebrew has been declared the

official language of the country while Arabic is the next most common language and is spoken by Israeli Arabs. Road signs and many advertisements are written in Hebrew, Arabic and English.

In addition to Sabras, native born Israelis, others have emigrated from countries around the world from United States, Europe and Russia, from South Africa and England, Denmark, Sweden and more. From Yemen, Morocco, and other Arabic countries. From South America and Central America, from Mexico and Cuba, Ethiopia. Migrant workers come from China, Romania, South America, Africa, and Thailand. The population of Israel as of July 2019, is 8,592,535. Population of New Jersey is 8,972,000. 60% of the land mass of Israel is desert, in the south, the Negev. In response to the dream of the first Prime Minister, David Ben Gurion, the desert has been under development for the past many years and is miraculously thriving in areas where one finds vegetable farms, vineyards, cattle ranches and flower nurseries, literally changing the desert into a garden. At the same time, scores of young entrepreneurs, citizens of the so-called "Start-up Nation" are inventing, creating, using technology to produce ideas and products that benefit the world at large.

We can count the number of languages spoken and the number of countries from which Israelis have emigrated and the type of work that is being done in Israel but each individual Sabra or emigrant comes with a story. There was a young man who grew up with his family in the town of Oaxaca, Mexico, a town famous for its arts and crafts. The young man, named Luis, was interested in the food business, especially bread baking and honed his skills at home. At the same time, in another part of the world, Leah, a Sabra, grew up in Jerusalem with her Canadian mother and American father. After her army service, Leah moved to New York and found a job as manager of a bakery in Hoboken. Leah found herself working with many Spanish speaking colleagues and felt the need to learn the language so she could better communicate with her staff.

Meanwhile, back in Oaxaca, Luis' mother was owner of a hostel where guests come from all over the world to visit and to study Spanish. Leah learned of this place and spent several months as a Spanish student in Oaxaca at the hostel. Luis was enrolled in cooking school and eventually, as it is with many young people, he was anxious to travel and wished to go to New York to find work. He examined his mother's records to discover who might have been at the hostel to learn Spanish and who was living and working in New York. Using Facebook, Luis asked for help in finding work in the food business. And there was this person called Leah working in a bakery. By now she had her own bakery business in the city. Luis contacted her, asked for employment in her shop and was accepted. Eventually, Luis and Leah became a couple and they married after he converted to Judaism. The two then moved back to Jerusalem, Leah's hometown. Today, they live in Jerusalem with their two children, Gael and Micaela, where they keep kosher and observe Shabbat.

After several years of planning and raising money, Leah and Luis opened a taqueria in Jerusalem. Leah manages the business while Luis and Leah's sister, Yittie, a professional cook, manage the kitchen. So next time you are in Jerusalem, stop in to TACOS LUIS on Queen Shlomzion Street # 11. Enjoy a kosher taco of your choice which is topped for special effect with a squeeze of lime juice. Try it. I think you'll like it.

Israel is all about its people. The stories are unique and together they weave a rich cultural fabric.

From Gan Mazon - MRT's Garden of Plenty

100% Donation Garden Supplying Local Pantries
with Organic Produce

Gan Mazon's success is due to its volunteers' dedication to a mission. Through the wood-working and installation talent of David Tuller and the artistic talent of long-time temple member Judy Raybon, a beautiful rendition of Gan Mazon's mission adorns the entrance to the garden's left door. Judy's and David's sign over the garden's right door honor volunteers from seasons past, present and future. Last season, David created, designed and installed the striking sign over the garden's center door. This season has been exceptionally bountiful. Garden of Plenty delivered 2,555 lbs. Another 710 lbs. were donated by my co-director Gloria Gross from her backyard garden's raised beds for a season total of 3,265 lbs.

Always the innovator, Gloria introduced 10 new tomato and 5 new pepper varieties to Gan Mazon. All were grown directly from seed in her home weeks before being placed as seedlings in our garden. When harvested, the produce looked store bought—perfectly shaped, unblemished and beautifully colored. Gloria deserves much credit for the 1,000 lbs. increase over Gan Mazon's 2018 total harvest.

A couple of months ago, I informed Margie Wold, our Temple's President, I would not return next season as Gan Mazon's co-director. My plan is to remain an active garden volunteer, leaving the decision making to others. After six years as Gan Mazon's director, and two seasons as its co-director. I take pride in the garden's physical growth achieved during my tenure, expanding to 2,000 square feet and then to its current 3,000 square feet. Its animal resistant fence, installed almost single-handedly by Brett Tuller, guarantees the garden will continue to provide produce for clients of Monmouth County's non-sectarian pantries. More importantly, Gan Mazon 2019's harvest is 5 times the yield of my first season as director.

I am pleased and excited to announce that temple member Eric Nathanson, an experienced vegetable gardener, has agreed to be my successor. With Gloria Gross continuing in her current role as co-director, Gan Mazon's will remain Monmouth Reform Temple's signature social action project under Eric's and Gloria's leadership.

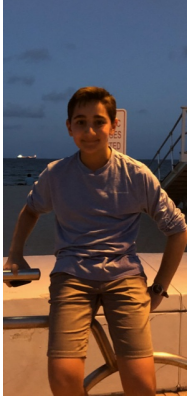
